Executive Summary



MESSAGE FROM CO-CHAIRS

The Southern Tier is Soaring.

2019 has been a great year for the Southern Tier, with hundreds of new projects underway that make it promising place for innovation and investment.

Because of the work of the Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council, communities across the region are witnessing an economic renaissance that is transforming the region's cities, towns and villages. Blighted and decaying buildings in Johnson City have been replaced by a gleaming new Health Sciences Campus; cityscapes from Watkins Glen to Owego to Elmira have come alive through renovations that enhance community vitality; and rural communities have seen new developments in agriculture that are opening new markets and increasing profitability.

Most importantly, the REDC is laying the foundation for new job creation. Regional projects such as 76West are attracting talented workers and new investors in advanced manufacturing and clean energy. New agribusinesses focused on products such as industrial hemp and high-tech food processing facilities are encouraging new investments in the region. Projects like SUNY-Corning Community College's STEAM Innovation Center are helping train and match workers for the economy of the future.

Governor Andrew Cuomo and the New York state legislature have recognized both the experience and vision of the Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council by awarding more than \$351 million in public support since 2011. These funds have supported over 600 projects, generating more than \$1.8 billion in private investments, while creating or retaining more than 25,000 jobs. In developing our plan, the Southern Tier REDC made a commitment to the community and to the state – and we've followed through! Of the 674 projects identified by the REDC, 86% are either completed or on schedule. This is a remarkable success rate that is creating visible change in our communities. This report provides more information about these successes, and points to the bright future ahead for our region.

We're not finished, yet however. There is more work to do before the Southern Tier reaches its full economic and social potential. Employing the same insight, attention to detail, and careful oversight, the Southern Tier REDC has identified 26 new projects that will attract more than \$109 million in new, private investment. Long recognized as a locus for technological innovation and for its quality of life, the Southern Tier will continue to Soar!

REGIONAL VISION

Building on a strong foundation of target industries, higher education institutions, the nonprofit sector, and government agencies, the Southern Tier will take a collaborative, regional approach to attract talent and investment for the development of industry clusters, especially advanced manufacturing, healthcare, food and agriculture, and tourism. Build the Greater Binghamton Innovation Ecosystem

Greater Binghamton will be a destination for talent and new business development. Revitalized urban centers in Binghamton, Johnson City and Endicott will maintain the area's legacy and position it as a major gateway, with strengths in advanced manufacturing, healthcare, culture, and high-technology development. Innovation Districts will capitalize on public-private collaborations and the growing presence of Binghamton University.



Invest in the Advanced Manufacturing Industry

A focus on advanced manufacturing and the transportation sector will result in the Southern Tier being recognized as a destination for manufacturing business development, distinguished by its concentration of multi-national anchor companies, advanced infrastructure to support innovation and technology, rich education and research resources, specialized skilled workforce and vibrant communities.

Transform the Food and Agriculture Industry

The Southern Tier will be a world-recognized leader in agriculture technology and serve as a key food supplier for the East Coast of the United States. A strategic mix of projects will transform and grow agriculture and food production, processing, and distribution across the region, while also strengthening links to growing tourism and manufacturing industries.

Promote the Southern Tier's Innovative Culture

The Southern Tier will be a well-recognized and highly desirable place to visit, live, and grow a business. We will promote the region's quality of life and capacity for innovation and ignite a fierce community pride that compels residents to be regional ambassadors to attract talent and inspire entrepreneurs.

Progress



General Progress in the Region

Economic development is an interdisciplinary practice that impacts many facets of everyday life. Whether you live in the Southern Tier, work in the Southern Tier, study in the Southern Tier, or are just visiting, there is no doubt that you have been impacted by development that is organic and unintentional or is very much intentional. There are many measures of success, and by many accounts, the Southern Tier is achieving the goals set by the Regional Economic Development Council in 2015 to attract talent and investment for the development of industry clusters, increase the size, quality and prosperity of the region's workforce, support new business creation in high-technology industries, ensure healthy communities, and protect the region's natural beauty and resources.

Just last year, economic development projects supported by the Regional Economic Development Council as "priority projects" recommended for ESD capital grants leveraged more than \$46 million through strategic investments of \$9 million, creating more than 250 jobs. These projects have helped to support and further develop an environment conducive to economic and community growth. This was evident over the past year (for the year ending May 2019, last available as of print deadline) as the number of private sector jobs in the Southern Tier rose by 1,100, or 0.5 percent, to 229,800. Job gains were greatest in educational, health services, and manufacturing,¹ representing growth in targeted industry clusters as set forth in the 2015 Southern Tier Soaring plan.

The following pages also describe in greater detail how strategic, regional initiatives such as the 76West clean energy business competition and the GROW-NY agribusiness competition have cultivated and supported new companies in targeted, high-growth industries. In the four years of 76 West to date, the competition has helped drive a fast-growing cluster of clean energy startups. 17 of the 18 winners of the 76West competitions are still operating in New York State. The 12 winners from the first two rounds of the competition have raised \$28 million in private capital and spent more than \$1.7 million on key suppliers in the Southern Tier. To date, 76West has brought 59 companies to the region to pursue intensive business development and receive expert mentoring. Further, the launch of GROW-NY this year attracted almost 200 applications from food and agricultural start-up companies from 23 states and 16 countries.

The Southern Tier REDC, since its inception in 2011, has supported 674 projects with \$351 million dollars in public support through the Consolidated Funding Application (CFA) process, which has leveraged more than \$1.5 billion in private funds for projects throughout the Southern Tier for a total strategic investment in the region of more than \$1.8 billion, and the creation and/or retention of more than 25 thousand jobs. This report will illustrate not only those projects and other efforts, but the impact of the Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council in shaping the economic landscape and everyday lives of the residents of all of the communities in the Southern Tier.

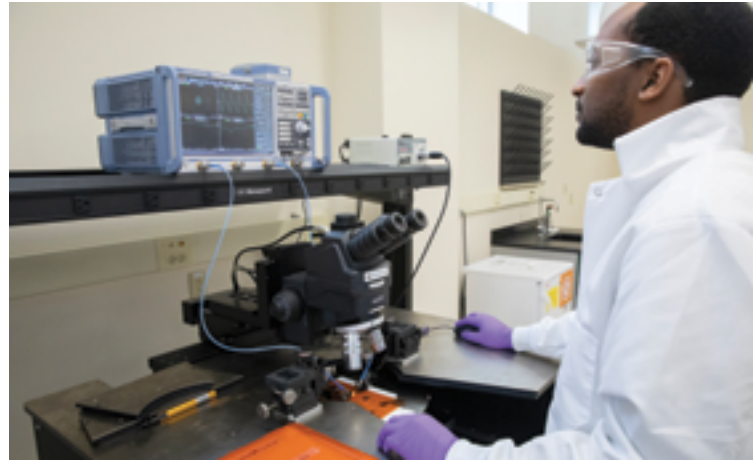




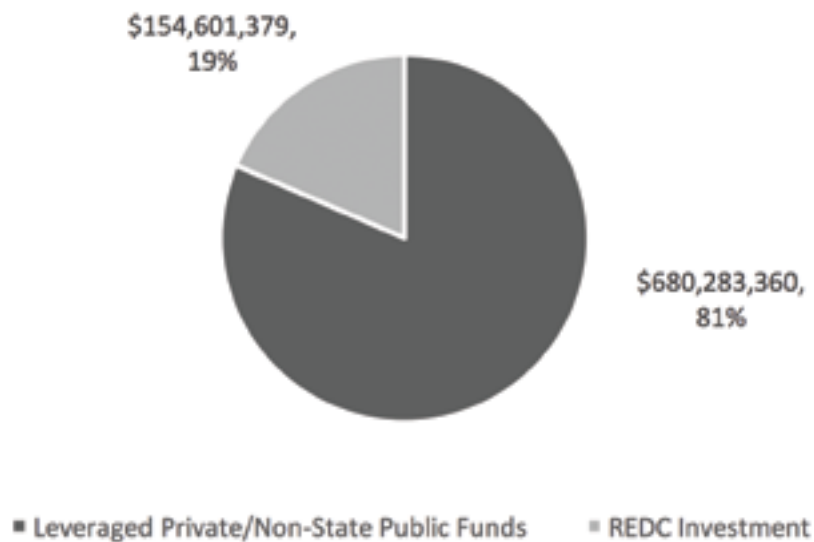
Status of Past Priority Projects

Over the past eight years, 163 Priority Projects have been awarded funding from Empire State Development Grant Funds through the Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council process. These strategic investments have leveraged more than \$680 million through \$154 million in public support, representing a total strategic investment in the region of more than \$834 million. In 2019 alone, CFA Round 8 priority projects leveraged more than \$46 million through a public investment of \$9 million.

One recent success resulting from last year's investment was the April 22 groundbreaking of the SUNY Corning Community College STEAM Innovation Center, which will explore and expand public-private partnerships with local employers to meet workforce needs. The STEAM Innovation Center will also be home to the Mechatronics Lab and Innovation Hub and will incorporate academic programs including digital design and mechatronics, a multidisciplinary field combining electronics and mechanical engineering. To support the STEAM Innovation Center, SUNY CCC was awarded a \$1 million CFA grant as part Round VIII of the Regional Economic Development Council awards in 2018. The funding will be used for site upgrades and to purchase and to install state-of-the-art equipment that will be used to prepare students with a rigorous education in new and emerging areas of technology, design, and science that supports industries such as advanced manufacturing.

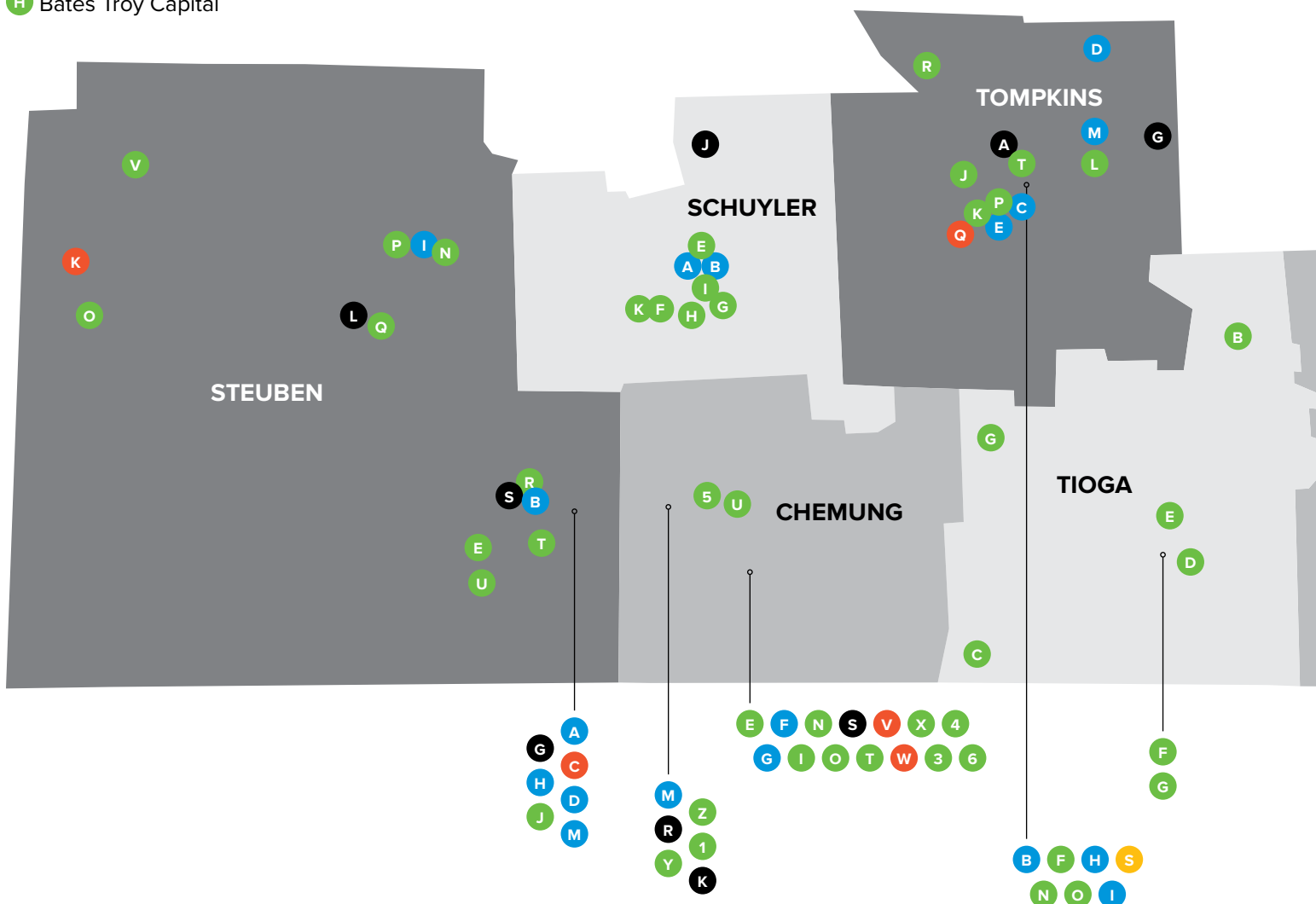

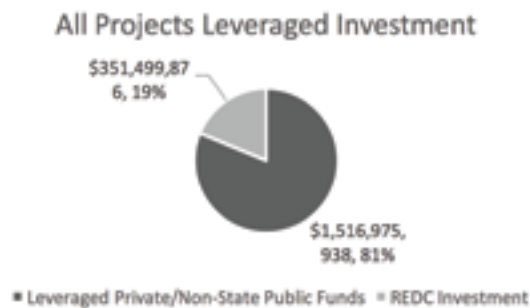

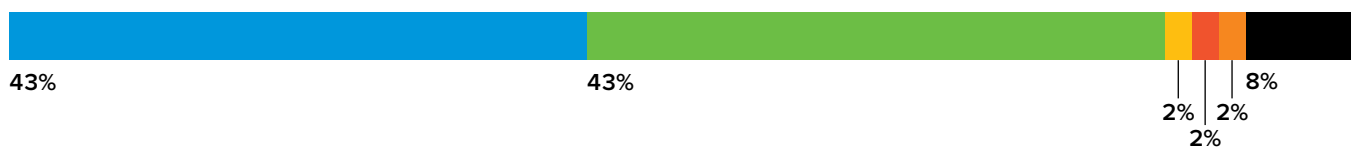


Status of All Projects Awarded CFA Funding

During the past eight years, **674** projects have been supported by the Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council. Through these strategic investments, **\$351 million** dollars in public support has leveraged more than **\$1.5 billion** in private funds for projects throughout the Southern Tier for a total strategic investment in the region of more than **\$1.8 billion** and the creation and/or retention of more than **25 thousand jobs**.

Strategies and Actions Related to State Priorities

CHILD CARE NEEDS AND POTENTIAL SOLUTIONS

The Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council will address the barriers of access to quality, affordable childcare through a strategic collaboration of childcare professionals, employers, funders, parents, service providers, government officials and agencies to identify community needs, leverage and maximize existing funding streams, support development of the childcare industry, and develop and support workforce development techniques that consider childcare as a critical facet of the workforce and economic development of the region.

With over 4,000 open positions across the Southern Tier, companies are increasingly looking for ways to hire and retain qualified employees. Consistently one of the top workforce barriers found by employers is childcare. This childcare issue affects the local businesses, families, and childcare providers.

Many childcare facilities in the Binghamton region, for example, are challenged to manage governmental and industry mandates, staff turnover, wage compression and an inadequate childcare subsidy. These factors have resulted in the closure of several childcare facilities. If left unaddressed, more facilities will begin to close their doors, which will decrease the options parents have in Broome County.

With a decrease in supply and increase in demand, financial pressures from industry regulations, and a competitive market for qualified staff, rising costs are passed onto families that already struggle to pay childcare expenses. At a certain point, it can become costlier for a family to have both parents in the workforce paying for childcare than it is for one parent to stay home, despite an existing, albeit, inadequate, childcare subsidy. This not only affects individual households, but negatively impacts the already strained workforce pool. This also disproportionately affects lower income

populations because childcare facilities which accept families utilizing the subsidy are at a competitive financial disadvantage that threaten the viability of childcare facilities.

There is an expectation by many that employers should exclusively bear the responsibility to solve the issues surrounding childcare. While businesses can and should play an important role, their intervention is limited because of a lack of expertise in the industry. Industry partners rely on the knowledge and experience of community partners to navigate the childcare industry and advise best practices that support childcare efforts. Childcare tax credits that incentivize companies to provide onsite childcare is one approach to this issue but has not seen great success because many employers are simply not in the business of childcare.

Several opportunities to address the barriers to quality, affordable childcare have been identified by the Southern Tier REDC Workforce Development Work Group, including:

- Proximity to care for workers;
- Options for stay-at-home parents to earn an income;
- Business incentives for employers offering or supporting care;
- Stability in regulations, operational costs, funding, staffing, and compensation for childcare centers and providers.

One solution, if implemented properly and with support, is employer contributions to an employee's childcare expenses which could be partly offset by a tax credit. This will incentivize businesses to help pay for employee childcare expenses. Employees can then make up the price difference between the employer's contribution and the cost of the childcare.

Additionally, many parents feel a burden to choose between affordability and quality when selecting care for their child. Parental satisfaction is the greatest test of a quality childcare facility. Any solution should empower parents to choose the best facility to meet their particular needs. Quality childcare can be in the form of a childcare facility or in-home childcare.

To effectively address the opportunities identified in the Southern Tier, the REDC will support solutions that help families overcome the barriers to access to quality, affordable childcare through strategic collaboration that meaningfully:

- Increase workforce participation;
- Support cost-effective training programs to certify childcare workers;
- Decrease the needed use of a subsidy;
- Create healthier, more viable childcare facilities;
- Increase home-based care options;
- Empower parents to make the best choices professionally and for their children.

ECONOMIC AND ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE STRATEGY

The Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council will advance economic equality, environmental justice, and sustainability in their establishment of new development strategies as well as support for industries entering or growing in the region by addressing existing environmental injustices that disproportionately impact low-income and/or minority communities in the region's cities and promoting responsible and sustainable resource management in its rural communities.

The Southern Tier is home to a diverse community, with diverse challenges. The region has a substantial rural population, with five out of eight counties considered majority rural (defined as an estimated 62-85 percent of the population living outside of metropolitan or micropolitan areas). The three majority urban counties are Broome (Greater Binghamton), Chemung (Elmira and Horseheads), and Tompkins (Ithaca).² Minority communities are concentrated in its cities (Ithaca, Binghamton, and Elmira), with poverty both an urban and rural issue. Several tracts, particularly in urban areas, exceeding 25

percent of households living in poverty. (The national poverty rate for households as of 2017 was 12.3 percent according to the U.S. Census Bureau.) The urban communities may bear a higher burden of exposure to environmental hazards as byproducts from past industrial projects including toxic wastewater discharge, traffic and air pollution, and most notably, exposure to lead paint and dust.

While the region has demonstrated “notable improvement over the past eight years,” across its economic landscape, growth has not been entirely equitable. While growth was driven in large part by gains in the educational and health-related sectors, analogous to national trends, a wide and growing gap persists between household median income in minority and white communities, high unemployment disproportionately borne by minority populations, and concentrated poverty in minority communities in urban areas.

The region's cities, including but not limited to, Binghamton, Elmira, Horseheads, and Ithaca, all contain a disproportionate share of older housing built prior to 1960. Because housing constructed prior to 1978 poses a greater risk for the presence of lead, the condition of housing is often indicative of lead exposure and higher negative health outcomes. The majority of neighborhoods in Binghamton have a high concentration of old housing, and a high concentration of low-income, minority residents. While this is a regional concern impacting every corner of the Southern Tier, more concentrated areas of concern include Binghamton, Endicott, Elmira, Horseheads and Ithaca because the urban cores have the compounded challenge of both high concentrations of low income, minority communities and close proximity to hazardous waste and chemical facilities.

In fact, a share of these sites are dedicated federal sites ('superfund' sites) identified for increased support and funding and pose a significant health risk to the surrounding communities.³ The presence of lead and proximity to 'superfund', or hazardous waste treatment, storage and disposal facilities do not in and of themselves constitute a health concern, but proximity to those facilities, especially by low-income communities living in rental housing, may be an indicator warranting further investigation. The CDC states that children living at or below the federal poverty level and those living in older housing are at greatest risk.

In rural areas, a key environmental issue is lack of broadband access. Broome, Chemung, Schuyler and Delaware Counties all contain large swaths of land with either nonexistent or inadequate broadband access.⁴ The Southern Tier is not alone in persistent gaps in broadband coverage, but Internet and cell phone coverage is key to providing rural communities the tools they need to realize environmental justice goals - including the tools to organize and manage access to natural resources.

Environmental justice encompasses environmental sustainability; enforcement of legal rights, access to decision-making and economic development enable vulnerable, marginalized and under-represented people to build health, resilient and powerful communities.⁵ New York State’s definition of environmental justice is “the fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color or income with respect to the development, implementation, and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations and policies. Fair treatment means that no group of people, including a racial, ethnic, or socioeconomic group, should bear a disproportionate share of the negative environmental consequences resulting from industrial, municipal and commercial operations or the execution of federal, state, local and tribal programs and policies. Fair treatment is also used in terms of equitable environmental benefits.”

In the rural context, this means recognizing lack of community institutions and leadership in addressing immediate environmental and economic impacts of negative environmental conditions. Rural environmental justice encompasses the spectrum of access to natural resources, access to services for managing and benefiting from natural resources, participation in decision-making about them, as well as co-management and control/ownership of natural resources.

Several opportunities to advance economic equality, environmental justice, and sustainability in the establishment of new development strategies have been identified by the Southern Tier REDC Innovative Cultures Work Group, including:

- Investment in infrastructure and downtown revitalization to build clean, energy-efficient housing and commercial space with a focus on affordable housing for vulnerable/marginalized communities; promotion of green buildings and “green” streets;
- Growth of renewable energies markets: the “green benefits” of equitable development include attracting innovation, businesses and population growth. The green economy is projected to increase as a share of the overall economy in the United States and brings opportunities to address systemic issues burdening some communities;
- Focus on adaptive reuse and development in existing population centers, including those with existing contaminated properties, in order to reduce sprawl, remediate existing properties, and promote sustainable urbanization;
- Reduce exposure to facilities/industries with environmental concerns;
- In late 2018 (December), the state announced Environmental Justice Community awards totaling \$2.6 million to 28 organizations.⁶ While the Southern Tier received \$93,525 (Material Reuse as Community Resource for Underserved Populations in Ithaca, NY, Finger Lakes ReUse, Inc.) there remains an opportunity to attract further state funding for environmental justice concerns.

The REDC recognizes that an overarching strategy to advance equitable development and environmental justice in the Southern Tier involves facilitating meaningful participation – namely, the development of a public participation plan to identify audiences that should be at the table, including potential community partners, local leaders, and resources to encourage open lines of communication. Participation in decision-making and establishing baseline issues are critical for an effective environmental justice plan.

The REDC will pursue a strategy of inclusion and consultation with community partners to 1) identify the chief environmental justice concerns within communities most affected by unemployment, poverty and environmental hazards; 2) develop a pipeline in partnership with the communities to encourage competitive projects that address the environmental justice concerns in the region.

In order to effectively address the opportunities identified in the Southern Tier, the REDC will implement the following strategies to advance economic equality, environmental justice, and sustainability in the region:

- Community-driven, meaningful engagement to establish baseline, priority issues for the most affected communities regarding environmental justice and equitable development;
- Establish research and baseline information to support creation of appropriate programs for job creation and workforce development for underserved populations;
- Prioritize job creation in clean and green fields such as renewable energies, energy efficiency, and green infrastructure;
- Prioritize reporting and accountability for job creation and remediation of environmental hazards in underserved communities;
- Prioritize remediation of existing environmental hazards as well as equitable economic development.

SUPPORT FOR COMMUNITY INVESTMENT IN PLACEMAKING AND DOWNTOWN REVITALIZATION

The Downtown Revitalization Initiative is a comprehensive approach to boosting local economies by transforming communities into vibrant neighborhoods. In its fourth year, the program will invest \$100 million in 10 additional downtowns across the state. According to the New York State Upstate Revitalization strategy, “placemaking is the notion that where investment occurs matters. In order to attract a talented workforce, our built environment must emphasize creating accessible job centers, sustainable infrastructure, and livable communities.”



The Southern Tier REDC acknowledges the important role of placemaking in promoting innovation and economic development, particularly in historic downtowns throughout the region. The Southern Tier REDC will focus on vibrant urban cores to improve perceptions of the region and attract private investment, new residents, innovation, and entrepreneurship. Adding to those efforts, the Southern Tier will leverage its unique and abundant natural resources, tightly knit communities that boast low costs of living, and world-renowned research universities that serve as a natural draw for a talented workforce and businesses looking for an innovative ecosystem.



Faced with the loss of major firms, combined with a declining population, the Southern Tier has been challenged with sprawling development and land use patterns that expand infrastructure, including the cost to maintain it, while the region's tax base simultaneously declined - resulting in sprawling population that has left regional downtowns sparse and blighted.

In its 2013 report, "Places in the Making: How Placemaking Builds Places and Communities⁷," the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Department of Urban Studies and Planning (MIT DUSP) observed that a major challenge with placemaking projects is a knowledge gap of local expertise, "A visionary project by a leader unfamiliar with the community is doomed to failure; placemakers need the right allies, advisers, and collaborators....Success of a placemaking project can hinge on the cooperation of a small group of savvy [community] insiders who are committed to the project."

Fortunately, the Regional Economic Development Council structure and DRI Local Planning Committees formed to guide these efforts in Elmira, Watkins Glen, Owego, and Hornell, are inherently designed to mitigate just this type of threat through a bottom-up approach to community and economic development that builds in community support and buy-in from day one. This collaborative approach provides a pathway to address blight in the region's urban cores by leveraging the institutional knowledge and community expertise to adjust strategies based on the unique needs and strengths of each downtown.

The REDC will support efforts to ensure that jobs are created in places people can get to, infrastructure development is focused on places that can be maintained, and projects that increase the density of downtowns and current employment centers are supported. With support and guidance of the Innovative Cultures Work Group the REDC will support efforts that:

- Create an active, desirable downtown with a strong sense of place;
- Attract new businesses (including "Main Street" businesses), that create a robust mix of shopping, dining, entertainment and service options for residents and visitors, and that provide job opportunities for a variety of skills and salaries;
- Enhance public spaces for arts and cultural events that serve the existing members of the community but also draw in visitors from around the region;
- Attract a diverse population, with residents and workers supported by complementary diverse housing and employment opportunities;
- Grow the local property tax base; and
- Provide amenities that support and enhance downtown living and quality of life.

In addition to the strategies adopted by the Elmira, Watkins Glen, Owego, and Hornell Local Planning Committees (LPCs), the REDC will continue its efforts to identify and support downtown projects from the 2016, 2017, 2018, and 2019 DRI communities and throughout the region as described in the 2019 REDC Guidebook.

Just this past year, 17 transformational projects for Owego were announced as part of their Round 3 DRI award. The strategic investments in downtown Owego will build upon the community's assets, including a historic core with crucial civic and cultural uses, a strong and growing arts and business community, access to local and regional tourist attractions, and well-established and historic residential neighborhoods surrounding the downtown core. The investments are part of the Governor's ongoing efforts to revitalize the upstate economy and create more opportunities for the Southern Tier. Specific projects funded include:

- **Enhance Waterfront Accessibility and Recreational Opportunities:** Provide access at key locations to the Susquehanna River and Owego Creek waterfronts and create connections between the Riverwalk and waterfront parks, increasing the use of these resources, drawing activity to existing and future businesses along Front Street, and providing attractive amenities to anticipated upper-story residences overlooking the walkway. The project will include aesthetic improvements, shoreline stabilization, and lighting and signage along the Riverwalk; expansion and improvements at boat launches; and installation of recreation amenities along the Owego Creek walking trails.
- **Enhance Recreation Amenities and Drainage Infrastructure at Marvin Park:** Install recreation amenities and improvements to the drainage system at Owego's largest open space, rendering the park easier to maintain by the village and enabling greater use by residents and visitors. Examples of potential improvements include landscaping, handicap-accessible playground equipment, resurfacing of the existing tennis and basketball courts, replacement of the existing skate park, walking path upgrades, restroom improvements, additional security measures, and additional drainage infrastructure and flood mitigation strategies.
- **Support the Creative Community with Marketing, Public Realm Amenities, and Improvements to the Tioga Arts Council Facility:** Create a dual marketing and branding strategy promoting Owego's creative community to attract and support local artists and arts-related businesses. The project will consist of developing cohesive branding for members of the local arts and business communities in coordination with the Tioga Arts Council, Historic Owego Marketplace, the Tioga County Chamber of Commerce, the Tioga County IDA, and the Tioga County Tourism Office, and hiring a professional marketing firm to create a marketing strategy, theme, branding logo, and comprehensive signage plan that will also serve as the basis for digital and social marketing, brochures and magnets, and improvements to building image and the public realm. This marketing and branding campaign will be supplemented by interior improvements to the Tioga Arts Council (TAC) facility to create greater opportunity for art exhibitions and arts-related programming. Facility upgrades include expanding existing gallery space, improving workshop space, enhancing the quality of Tech Lab space, and implementing environmentally-friendly strategies.
- **Improve Accessibility at the Coburn Free Library:** Construct an elevator system providing access to all floors of the historic Coburn Free Library, enhancing its ability to meet all of the educational needs of the community. The construction will include a 1,200-square-foot annex with an elevator shaft and system, including required electrical connections, necessary modifications to the building, expanded reading room space, and handicapped restrooms.
- **Expand the Ti-Ahwaga Performing Arts Center's Facility and Capacity:** Expand the Ti-Ahwaga Performing Arts Center to increase its capacity for productions and programming and create new educational opportunities for Owego residents. The expansion will consist of a 2,200 square-foot addition to the ground level of the southwest side of the existing structure, as well as a new full basement of the same size, to provide an easily accessible workspace for building and storing production materials, enabling the existing storage space and stage to be leveraged for additional programming, rentals, events, meetings, parties, films, and concerts.
- **Expand the Tioga County Historical Society Museum:** Expand the Tioga County Historical Society Museum's 1959 facility to create additional space for exhibits, storage, a lecture hall, and office space, enabling the museum to increase its exhibit and programming capacity, drawing more visitors from the community and beyond, and bolstering Owego's identity as a destination for arts, culture, and history in the Southern Tier.
- **Transform a Vacant Lot into the North Avenue Art Park:** Transform a highly visible vacant lot on North Avenue into a unique creative space anchoring the Owego Creative Community and serving as a recreational resource for residents of all ages. The North Avenue Art Park will include an interactive sculpture garden, an amphitheater, and on-site parking in a new public lot accessible from Central Avenue.

- **Enhance Downtown Parking Options:** Improve downtown parking lots, increase the visibility of available spots, and reconfigure employee parking options to leverage existing underutilized parking options and facilitate access to DRI businesses and amenities. This project will include better signage directing visitors to parking lots with a surplus of spaces and a comprehensive parking strategy reorganizing the village's supply.
- **Improve Key Facades as Cornerstones of Revitalization:** Improve prominent downtown facades to collectively transform the village, improving its outward-facing image, attracting new businesses and residents, and encouraging visitors to linger, explore, and frequent attractions throughout DRI area. Properties identified for improvement include the JJ Newberry Building, 32-34 Lake Street, 194 Front Street, 53-55 North Avenue, 57-59 North Avenue, 62-64 North Avenue, 100-106 North Avenue, 132-134 North Avenue, and 50 Lake Street.
- **Upgrade Lake Street Infrastructure to Support Mixed Uses:** Repair and upgrade the collectively-owned sanitary sewer line supporting the mixed-use buildings along the western side of Lake Street, integrating the line into the public system and enabling the maintenance necessary to ensure community health and full use of the retail and residential properties affected. DRI funds will also support comprehensive mapping of the sanitary sewer system.
- **Enhance Lighting along Southside Drive:** Repair streetlights along the southside portion of the village and improve electrical connections to better link this area to the downtown core and increase safety for people of all ages and abilities, resulting in greater visitor activity with beneficial impacts for downtown shops and restaurants.
- **Restore the Owego Central Fire Station:** Restore the historic Owego Central Fire Station as a North Avenue anchor to protect a historic resource integral to Owego identity and maintain the downtown charm and character that appeals to residents, visitors, and businesses. Proposed physical improvements include facade enhancement, stabilization of the bell tower, masonry, repairs, repointing, repainting, roof replacement, chimney work, interior repairs, expanded accessibility, basement repairs and flood proofing, signage improvements, and repaving.
- **Create a Mixed-Use Brewery as a Gateway to North Avenue:** Transform an existing building on North Avenue into mixed-use facility serving as a gateway to Owego to spur further redevelopment of this neglected end of this main artery leading to the heart of the village. The project will include a craft brewery and tap room, food service, non-profit/artist incubator space, three residential units, and public open space capitalizing on the facility's location at the threshold of the Finger Lakes Beer and Wine Trail.
- **Support the Development of a Diverse Business Community:** Provide suitable structures for office, residential, commercial, and studio uses in the DRI Area through new construction, upgrades to existing buildings at key sites, and expansion of existing small businesses. This multi-site effort responds to applications received during the DRI planning process and includes projects at 127 McMaster Street, Ice Cream Works, Home Central, 171 Front Street/2 Court Street, the Cellar Restaurant building, 20 Church Street, 37-41 Lake Street, and the Parkview Restaurant and Hotel.
- **Complete the Restoration of a Prominent Mixed-Use Building:** Close a funding gap to complete the transformation of a formerly blighted building at 167-169 Main Street into a mixed-use facility, attracting a diverse population of residents and workers with market-rate housing opportunities and updated amenities at one of the village's most prominent intersections. The project includes eight new apartments, two new commercial spaces, and an enhanced facade.

- **Create a Modern Industrial Employment Hub:** Facilitate the expansion of Applied Technology Manufacturing Corporation (ATMC), which will transform a dilapidated site into a modern industrial building and property and create 6-10 new jobs. The project consists of rehabilitating the northern end of the 14,000-square-foot building and demolishing and reconstructing the southern end.
- **Create a Neighborhood Non-Profit Hub and Emergency Shelter:** Construct a non-profit hub on a 1.6-acre parcel on North Depot Street to provide conference rooms, a large training room, and affordable rental space including shared printers, telephones, office space and utilities to charitable organizations, freeing up funds for community services and staff support. The facility will also serve as a community emergency shelter with temporary accommodations for 150 displaced residents, as well as showers and a kitchen for their use. The sponsor is also pursuing the possibility of adding residential use at this site at a later date.

In July of this year, a key project funded through the Watkins Glen DRI award was completed as part of the overall transformation of their main thoroughway, Franklin Street. In coordination with NYSDOT repaving, work was completed on the installation of conduit and foundations and new light fixtures were installed.

Significant progress was also made this year in downtown Elmira, the Southern Tier's first awarded community through the Downtown Revitalization Initiative. Work was completed in September on a mixed-use development on a vacant lot in the center of Elmira's downtown at 100 West Water Street. The project will include a four-story building with approximately 50 market rate apartment units, 16,700-square-feet of retail and commercial space on the ground floor, and outdoor landscaping with amenities. The project will enhance Elmira's downtown by creating an active 18-hour environment of commercial, retail and residential uses.

Additionally, construction began on the new Lake Erie College of Osteopathic Medicine (LECOM), made possible by a \$3 million grant through Round 8 of the CFA process. The two-story, 52,628 square foot building at the vacant Arnot Park in downtown Elmira

will accommodate a new medical school program, attracting students who will fill the need for physicians in the Southern Tier and Western New York. This project is expected to create 44 new jobs and is set to open for students in the spring of 2020. It will also include the demolition of blighted houses adjacent to the facility.

While progress continues on projects in Elmira, Watkins Glen, Owego, and the planning process gets underway in Hornell, continued technical assistance and project management by state agencies will be needed to advance each community's strategy for downtown revitalization and their DRI and non-DRI projects. Further, the Downtown Revitalization Initiative has led to additional development interest in awarded downtowns. Each community will continue to promote and support investment that creates a vibrant downtown and attracts new residents, visitors, businesses, and employment opportunities.

SUPPORT FOR THE WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVE

Targeted job training and education is critical in addressing the Southern Tier's need for quality labor. The Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council will support workforce development and training programs that align worker skills with industry needs.

America's labor shortage impacts all communities, and the Southern Tier is no exception. Population projections demonstrate declining population through 2040. However, the region is showing positive signs of growth. According to NYS Department of Labor statistics, the Southern Tier showed an increase in both the numbers of people in the Labor Force and the number employed in 2018 for the first time since 2008. However, serious workforce shortages remain that threaten to slow the economy and hinder growth. Two of the largest challenges to this workforce shortage remain: 1) increasing opportunities for women with children in the workplace and 2) increasing the skills of currently unemployed or underemployed workers to match the skills needed by employers. The Southern Tier REDC will continue to prioritize and support efforts that address:

- **Shrinking Labor Pool and Increasing Labor Demand:** The region's eligible labor pool reached a low (back to 1990) in 2017. Those remaining in the local labor force have had greater success in finding employment opportunity, evidenced by the shrinking unemployment rate, but many job opportunities remain unfilled.
- New York State's Jobs Express lists 5,500 openings throughout the Southern Tier in a range of industries and levels of skills, with the largest number of openings in Healthcare Practitioner and Technical (854); Office, Clerical and Secretarial (611) and Sales and Related (609). Most of the positions listed in these fields require specific, higher-level skills.
- A shortfall in affordable childcare.
- Lack of low-cost public transportation.
- Elevated number of potential workers unable to pass a drug test.
- Prior convictions leading to employer bias.
- **Safety Net Cost/Benefit Analysis:** potential financial disincentive for families and/or individuals on safety net assistance to accept lower-wage employment.
- Retention of young professionals/millennials.
- **Aligning Human Capital with Career Opportunities:** effectively marketing job opportunities to the regional workforce and addressing skills gap issues.

In order to better align worker skills with industry needs and develop a pipeline of quality labor through support of targeted job training and education, the REDC Workforce Development Work Group will evaluate projects in a standardized way to ensure alignment with both the regional and statewide workforce priorities. The work group will also implement the following strategies that address these regional opportunities, including:

- Leverage the \$175 million Workforce Development initiative (WDI) program as well as other local, state, and federal resources to maximize the impact of workforce development programs including apprenticeships programs by connecting local partners with relevant resources and support;

- Identify opportunities for continued support of programs and projects that align employer needs with training through regional providers and qualified educators;
- Will better engage, highlight and support workforce efforts along the K-12 pipeline to help local school districts maximize impact and alignment with REDC priorities:
 - STREDC's Workforce Development Work Group will engage regional school superintendents in planning for projects to utilize workforce development funding;
- Support programs related to the shortfall in affordable childcare to help unlock more workforce talent:
 - STREDC's Workforce Development Work Group will continue to support projects to increase both the number and the diversity of childcare openings throughout the region;
- Encourage apprenticeship training to help regional businesses hire and support more knowledgeable and productive workers:
 - Support emerging apprenticeship programs such as healthcare and information technology in addition to more established programs in manufacturing and the trades;
 - Support pre-apprenticeship programs to create a skilled pipeline of workers.
 - Support pre-apprenticeship programs to create a skilled pipeline of workers.

An early success of the Southern Tier REDC's efforts to support our need for quality labor is the SUNY Corning Community College (SUNY CCC) STEAM Innovation Center, which will explore and expand public-private partnerships with local employers to meet workforce needs. The STEAM Innovation Center will also be home to the Mechatronics Lab and Innovation Hub and will incorporate academic programs including digital design and mechatronics, a multidisciplinary field combining electronics and mechanical engineering. The center, made possible through a \$1 million Round 8 CFA grant, broke ground in April of this year.

Implementation of Key Regional Priorities

BUILD THE GREATER BINGHAMTON INNOVATION ECOSYSTEM

Greater Binghamton will be a destination for talent, new business development and partnerships for commercialization of emerging technologies. Revitalized urban centers in Binghamton, Johnson City and Endicott will maintain the area's legacy and position it as a major gateway, with strengths in advanced manufacturing, healthcare, culture and high-technology development. Innovation Districts will capitalize on public-private collaborations and the growing presence of Binghamton University.

According to the Brookings Institute, Innovation Districts, or "iDistricts" are "geographic areas where leading-edge anchor institutions and companies cluster and connect with start-ups, business incubators, and accelerators. They are also physically compact, transit-accessible, and technically-wired and offer mixed-use housing, office, and retail." Greater Binghamton has three unique, physically compact and transit-accessible downtown districts — Endicott, Johnson City, and Binghamton — that are united by common waterways, transportation networks and anchor institutions. Through the recent creation of iDistricts in these urban cores, the Southern Tier REDC will support efforts to encourage dense development where leading-edge anchor institutions and companies can cluster and connect with start-ups, business incubators and accelerators to become drivers of a new advanced economy in the iDistricts and beyond.

The region has a rich history of innovation and business development in emerging industries, but to remain competitive in the global market, the region must focus on high-tech and high-value production that can build on both historical and more recent regional

strengths including defense, aerospace, transportation, health-related technology, and clean energy. Part of this effort must include a focus on closing the skills gap by developing the available workforce to fill current open jobs as well as jobs where demand is projected to grow.

One opportunity that the Southern Tier REDC has identified includes the more than 60,000 students annually who are educated at the Southern Tier's colleges and universities. These students and associated institutions represent a powerful research, teaching, training and networking engine that can accelerate the region's local innovation economies.

Additionally, recent investment in the area, including the \$20 million Greater Binghamton Fund, BU Health Science Innovation Park in Johnson City, Koffman Southern Tier Incubator in Binghamton, and NextFlex and Charge C4V in Endicott, can act as a catalyst for additional investment, amplifying the economic impact and creating opportunities to grow the innovation ecosystem around the three iDistricts.

To maintain the Greater Binghamton Ecosystem's legacy as an innovation hub and position it to capitalize on recent investments in the three "iDistrict's," The Southern Tier REDC Greater Binghamton Work Group will support efforts that:

- Build upon the three Innovation Districts that will become drivers of a new advanced economy in Greater Binghamton: the City of Binghamton iDistrict, the Johnson City Health and Cultural iDistrict and the Endicott Advanced Manufacturing iDistrict;
- Continue to support projects that build upon investments made through the Greater Binghamton Fund;
- Invest in regional strengths in advanced manufacturing, healthcare, culture and high-technology development;



- Leverage and support the R&D capabilities of academia and industry in the region, giving Southern Tier companies a competitive edge, attracting new jobs and creating opportunities for a reinvigorated workforce;
- Advance New York State initiatives, particularly workforce development and increased access to childcare, two issues that currently limit the region's ability to fill open jobs and keep qualified employees; and
- Connect more business, property owners, and organizations to resources that enable them to thrive in the Greater Binghamton ecosystem.

One recent success includes implementation of the \$20 million Greater Binghamton Fund to facilitate key economic development projects in Binghamton, Johnson City and Endicott as outlined in the Southern Tier Soaring plan. The Greater Binghamton Fund awarded grants to 32 innovative and creative projects. Combined, the projects that will be supported by the transformative initiative will include 139,000 square-feet of renovated or new commercial space, 12 streetscape or public realm projects, the renovation of four historically significant properties, 30 public art installations, 3 demolitions, 20 façade renovations, the adaptive reuse of nine vacant buildings and the construction of 145 new affordable and market-rate housing units. All told, the initiative represents a combined \$80.3 million in both public and private investment.

The Southern Tier REDC, under the guidance and implementation efforts of the Greater Binghamton work group, will support the region's efforts to promote advanced manufacturing, entrepreneurial activities, workforce development efforts and quality of life as it relates to the Greater Binghamton innovation ecosystem. Because Binghamton University is a major economic driver not only in Binghamton, but in all three iDistricts and the Greater Binghamton area, the REDC will also continue to support the university as it improves its academic profile, grows its research portfolio, extends its economic reach and improves the overall academic experience for its students.

INVEST IN THE ADVANCED MANUFACTURING INDUSTRY

The Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council is focused on advanced manufacturing, in particular the growing transportation, clean energy and industrial hemp industry sectors, that will result in the Southern Tier being recognized as a destination for manufacturing business development, distinguished by its concentration of multi-national anchor companies, advanced infrastructure to support innovation and technology, rich education and research resources, specialized skilled workforce and vibrant communities. The REDC is further committed to bringing recognition of the Southern Tier and New York State as a leader in innovation and integration of battery technology and the energy storage sector as a major component of Governor Cuomo's Reforming the Energy Vision strategy and the industrial hemp sector as a key component of New York State's growing leadership role in this agriculture and manufacturing sector.

In the clean energy sector, a major challenge is the global race for development and application of battery technology in multiple arenas ranging from personal autos and last mile delivery trucks, to transportation initiatives being undertaken by UBER, avionics, military application, and locally made products such as forklifts. The battery technology business sector currently is dominated by Asian markets, and an investment in the U.S. presence is paramount in this major industrial wave. NYS's commitment to clean energy together with its leading R&D efforts positions it well as a potential magnet for business development. There also will be a need to address long-term challenges with the development of battery recycling businesses. At the same time, the rapid growth in energy storage projects is resulting in an increasing demand for a strong and qualified supply chain.

The rapidly growing energy storage arena also involves challenges such as the design and assembly of energy packs for large-scale energy storage projects; specifically, the lack of domestic companies that provide "system integration" in support of energy storage projects and manufacturers of products such as forklifts.

New York State established its leadership role in hemp processing with the nation's first government investment in a processing facility in the Binghamton area. It will be important to continue major investments such as this and develop businesses in order to maintain this leadership position in a highly competitive and growing business sector.

The Southern Tier REDC Advanced Manufacturing Work Group seeks to support efforts that power the growth and development of the advanced manufacturing industry, focusing on the transportation equipment manufacturing sector in the Southern Tier, that:

- Include high levels of R&D and commitment to innovation in emerging technologies;
- Continuously recharge the skills pipeline and attract STEM workers, with a focus on creating an experienced workforce necessary to support growing demand in advanced manufacturing such as industrial hemp and those in support of the energy storage and the cutting-edge clean energy economy;



- Strengthen the advanced manufacturing ecosystem;
- Advance New York State initiatives including Global NY, Start-Up NY, Hot Spots, Opportunity Agenda, Manufacturing Industry Cluster Program, Veterans Initiative, NY Rising and NYSTAR;
- Build and promote Governor Cuomo's comprehensive clean energy strategy and contribute to achievement of Reforming the Energy Vision (REV) goals with development of a regional economic development strategy that includes development and application of clean energy innovation and also grows New York's clean energy economy through business growth, new business attraction and large-scale renewable energy development. This strategy involves collaboration with NY-BEST, NYSEDA, 76WEST Clean Energy Competition and Advanced Clean Energy Research, NY Green Bank, and the Net Zero Energy for Economic Development and other NYS climate initiatives; and
- Enhance New York State's national leadership role in the industrial hemp sector with application of R&D in production and new product development, development of industrial hemp processing facilities and related supply chain development. This strategy leverages New York State's investment in its Industrial Hemp Agricultural Research Pilot Program, R&D programs at Cornell University and SUNY Morrisville, and the New York State Industrial Hemp Processing Grant Fund.

To accomplish this, the Southern Tier REDC has identified the following approaches to help implement their regional strategy:

- Leverage recent NYS investments in battery technology manufacturing, energy storage and industrial hemp processing;
- Incentivize financial investment by regional businesses undertaking projects that involve application of battery technology in both the production of existing products as well as commercialization of R&D in new product development;
- Assess the scope of business development required in the region to continue to establish industry clusters related to manufacturing and commercial use of new technology such as battery recycling;
- Identify site work and capital improvement projects required to support business growth in energy technology, renewable energy and industrial hemp sectors;
- Create joint ventures or other collaborative relationships across the Southern Tier Region;
- Support efforts that establish a qualified workforce; and
- Establish strong global anchors and a supportive supply chain.

More specifically, the Southern Tier REDC Advanced Manufacturing Work Group will build off efforts from the past several years and strive to implement an ambitious action plan over the next year that:

- Leverages investments by NYS in the Southern Tier including energy storage projects, battery technology development (i.e., 76WEST) and battery manufacturing (i.e., Charge C4V);
- Stimulates demand among its corporate drivers that will propel the need for new businesses involved in the application of battery technology. Examples of regional leaders include Amphenol Aerospace and AIO, BAE, Corning Incorporated, Ensco Avionics, Lockheed, Raymond Corporation, NextEra, Invenergy and Calpine;
- Meets demand for qualified supply chain businesses ranging from sourcing battery packs to systems integration to recycling;

- Fills gaps in demand for time-to-market supply for new mobile and stationary applications, as well as, secondary market requiring routine battery replacement in high demand segments such as taxis;
- Increases R&D and commercialization of new technology for application in both the private and military sectors;
- Leverages R&D at Binghamton University, Cornell University and Corning, Inc.; among the top in the world;
- Enhances local basic infrastructure with application of battery technology and energy storage;
- Site development in support of expansion of existing businesses and new business development;
- Talent attraction and workforce development.

TRANSFORM THE FOOD AND AGRICULTURE INDUSTRY

The Southern Tier will be a world-recognized leader in agriculture technology and serve as a key food supplier for the East Coast of the United States. Leveraging the global reach and strengths of Cornell University's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, together with the region's natural assets and strong private sector investment, a strategic mix of projects will transform and grow agriculture and food production, processing and distribution across the region, while also strengthening links to growing tourism and manufacturing industries.

With more than \$5B in output –representing almost 10% of the region's total economy – the food and agriculture industry (including food service) is a significant tradable sector in the Southern Tier that continues to grow. Given its proximity to key East Coast markets, the Southern Tier's expertise in food production, combined with local, regional, and state support to increase capacity, Southern Tier food and agriculture industry could expand market share.

While home to more than 5,600 farms (representing the cultivation of just over 1.1M acres) and more than 9,000 full-and part-time farm operations, the Southern Tier faces an aging workforce. The average age of a farm operator was 58 in 2012. A key inhibitor of agricultural growth in the Southern Tier is its short growing season, which demands greater support of developments in plant science technology, controlled environment agriculture and renewable energy.

However, as traditional centers of agriculture production lose market share due to weather and natural resources scarcity, the Southern Tier has an opportunity to scale up production to meet demand for food products within the state and throughout the Northeast in the areas of produce, cattle and specialty organics. The region also benefits from an abundance of fresh water, which will become increasingly important as other regions of the country continue to struggle with drought.

To accomplish this, the Southern Tier REDC has identified the following approaches to help implement their regional strategy:

- Develop and deploy new technologies to transition the Southern Tier from being a highly seasonal, occasional provider of food products to a reliable source of supply for the East Coast;
- Promote and leverage existing and new support structures for growers and producers in the region, including the \$30 million Southern Tier Agricultural Economic Development Initiative, to help expand farms and increase their profitability;
- Increase the diversity of and access to food processing facilities around the region, including slaughterhouses, meatpacking and poultry processing facilities, dairy processing facilities and aseptic packaging facilities for vegetables;
- Leverage our location at the crossroads of upstate New York via the creation of a “food hub” network that facilitates market connections and distribution of food products for production centers in regions across the state;
- Pioneer workforce development programs designed to bolster food and agriculture industries;
- Advance New York State initiatives;
- As adopted in 2017, the REDC will continue to focus on industrial hemp processing to increase the diversity and access to processing facilities.

A primary focus over the past year was the launch of a major food and agricultural business competition, in partnership with New York State, to advance tech and innovation in the food and agricultural industry in Upstate NY. Grow-NY accepted applications for its first round this Spring and received nearly 200 applications for new businesses seeking to compete for multiple prizes and mentorship. The Grow-NY Food and Ag Summit will take place on November 12-13, 2019. The Grow-NY business competition will culminate its first year in November 2019 by awarding four major prizes. The competition addresses many of the goals outlined by the REDC Food and Agriculture Work Group including the development and deployment of new technologies to enhance New York’s agricultural potential as a key provider to the country’s food supply.

Last year also welcomed more food and agriculture-related applications through the CFA than in past years. These projects include Damiani Shared Wine Facility, Tiberio, Custom Meats, and Willow Run for a state investment of \$2.02 million. This support leveraged more than \$8.1M for a total investment of \$10.2 million into the Southern Tier agriculture economy.

A priority focus in the year ahead will be growing the hemp industry in the Southern Tier. The Food and Agriculture Work Group is developing a regional approach to industrial hemp that focuses on research and development of plants best suited for cultivation and processing among various applications, as well as a policy position on how the REDC can support companies in the emerging market for hemp products.

Individual counties also continued to focus on cultivating the food processing sector, including dairy, meats, and other food products, especially where innovation in food production overlaps with traditional industry, encouraged by the work of the Food and Agriculture Work Group.

PROMOTE THE SOUTHERN TIER'S INNOVATIVE CULTURE

The Southern Tier will be a well-recognized and highly desirable place to learn, visit, live, and grow a business because the region's distinct combination of educational strength, culture, innovation, leisure-related industries, and natural resources creates a lifestyle that couples the convenience of larger cities with opportunities to lead a healthy lifestyle surrounded by natural beauty.

The Southern Tier REDC will support efforts that expand and strengthen its entrepreneurial ecosystem and in particular those efforts that leverage the region's NYSTAR Innovation Hot Spot (Southern Tier Startup Alliance), business incubators, and other resources, as well as those that the Southern Tier's reputation for high quality-of-life. "Quality of life" includes everything from physical health, mental health, and general wellbeing to more complex metrics of life satisfaction such as education, wealth, optimism/attitude, access to transportation, employment security, nature and the environment, access to housing, family and support systems, and other social relationships.

The Southern Tier REDC Innovative Culture Work Group strives to further develop a high quality of life for residents and visitors by creating and supporting an environment that welcomes new, innovative ideas, and promoting those ideas, along with existing assets, not just outside of the region but within it. The Southern Tier has significant innovation assets in both research development and a highly educated population, assets that consistently remain underutilized in new company formation, commercialization and technology transfer. A regional approach advances the goal to better use existing assets to increase the pace of commercialization and the success rate of new startups.

There continues to be fragmentation of the entrepreneurial ecosystem among cities and towns within the Southern Tier. This lack of cohesion in the startup community can lead to difficulty in information sharing and knowledge building among entrepreneurs, particularly how and where to start companies within the region, leading to fewer companies started and slower progress of those that do. Some challenges that have resulted from a fragmented entrepreneurial ecosystem include:

- Outside providers of capital look at opportunities in the region as "one-offs" rather than the region as a whole representing a broader and more attractive opportunity set, leading to a lower level of outside startup capital invested in the region;
- Existing resources, most of which have very narrow domain foci (such as the aforementioned centers at Cornell, Binghamton and Corning) find themselves with limited geographic reach, leading to inefficient utilization of existing resources;
- The 61,000 students educated in the region find it easier to search for jobs with large companies outside of the region than with a growing startup base in the region, leading to a missed opportunity to help stem the tide of the region's "brain drain".

The "brain drain" is a continuing challenge for the Southern Tier as young people leave the region rather than growing their talents and economic impact locally. As young people leave, startups are challenged in identifying and retaining talent locally, leading to uncertainty in a new company's ability to grow and remain based in the region. The Southern Tier continues to work to develop opportunities to attract investors and better connect them to the entrepreneurs in this region. The Hot Spot has catalogued and mapped investors already present in the region in order to better leverage current investments to attract more venture capital.

From 2013-2019 (as of August 2019), the Southern Tier received more than \$74M in competitive funding from federal Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) program grants to support high-tech, high-growth companies, representing nearly a fifth of the total awards received in New York State. While meaningful to awardees, there is an opportunity to strengthen the regional technology transfer pipeline in order to make

the leap from federal grant funding to private venture capital.

Southern Tier startups cite two main reasons for leaving the region: 1. There is no available funding for companies; 2. There are not enough talented workers in the region. In the Southern Tier, there is a high density of college graduates, but few jobs to keep them in the region. The Southern Tier Startup Alliance has the opportunity to continue supporting the growth of startups and entrepreneurial activity that will retain those college graduates, and create more opportunities for the existing workforce.

Further, people already view the Southern Tier as an attractive place to live and recognize the region for its quality of life. There is opportunity to enhance that existing reputation by increasing tourism growth in the Southern Tier. While the Southern Tier has experienced steady growth in this industry since 2011, tourism still only represents a small portion of overall jobs in the region and those jobs often pay less than the regional average.

To continue building the Southern Tier's profile as a highly desirable place to learn, visit, live, and grow a business, the Southern Tier REDC will support efforts that:

- Strengthen the region's tourism and community assets and use them to promote the region to visitors, prospective talent and investors;
- Advance commercialization of technology by maximizing innovation and intellectual capital among private-sector and academic institutions. The Southern Tier Startup Alliance takes a leading role in implementing this strategy; and
- Attract and nurture a critical mass of entrepreneurs by promoting the commercialization of research from the region's sources of innovation, retaining the brightest college graduates and providing an entrepreneurial ecosystem including incubators, seed capital, support services and attractive communities.

To accomplish this, the Southern Tier REDC has identified the following approaches to help implement their regional strategy:

- Continued investment in innovation clusters across the Southern Tier will have a long-lasting impact on building an ecosystem of companies, innovation, and job growth.
- Continued development of sources of capital for startups in the region. While the regional ecosystem has seen growth in access to capital (see progress overview below), the disparity between access to capital for downstate companies and upstate companies is still large, and limits the growth of startup development in the region, and their ability to remain in the region as they grow.
- Leverage our higher education institutions across the region to lead efforts that support innovation and help spur local economic development.
- Expand broadband and achieve "last-mile" coverage in the region to increase quality of life, especially educational outcomes and making these attractive areas to live and start a business.
- Enhance the Southern Tier's existing reputation as a place with a high quality of life by continuing to grow and promote the tourism industry in the region.

More specifically, the Southern Tier REDC Innovative Culture Work Group will build off efforts from the past several years and strive to implement an ambitious action plan over the next year by focusing on two key strategies work hand-in-hand. First, in order to continue attracting young professionals, the REDC must be positioned to offer high-quality jobs and quality of life. The Southern Tier boasts quality education, neighborhoods, outdoors activities, and cultural event year-round however there is an opportunity to further support an environment that supports entrepreneurs and attracts companies that will create the jobs young professionals are looking for. To do this, the REDC will leverage regional assets to attract and support entrepreneurs.

Over the past year, progress has been made in achieving these goals. Specifically, Southern Tier incubators are working collaboratively to leverage resources and support regional entrepreneurs through the Southern Tier Startup Alliance. The Southern Tier Startup Alliance, the region's NYSTAR-designated and

funded Innovation Hot Spot, is a member organization of the region's incubators. From 2016 to date, the STSA has increased the connections of regional startups to capital, and increased deal flow for investors looking at opportunities in the region. The Southern Tier Startup Alliance advised on 97 deals in that time period, and raised \$80.2 million in funding, including grants, loans and investment. The Southern Tier Startup Alliance and business incubator partners have made strides in knitting together the entrepreneurial ecosystem in the Southern Tier. While there is room to improve, the Southern Tier Startup Alliance has made strides in leveraging the region's resources and provides coordination to better support startups across the region regardless of their location.

Additionally, in 2019, the NYSEDA 76West Clean Energy Competition held its fourth annual event in Binghamton, with the Southern Tier Clean Energy Incubator in Binghamton continuing to provide support and space for new companies putting down roots. In the four years of 76 West to date, the competition has helped drive a fast-growing cluster of clean energy startups. 17 of the 18 winners of the 76West competitions are still operating in New York State. The 12 winners from the first two rounds of the competition have raised \$28 million in private capital and spent more than \$1.7 million on key suppliers in the Southern Tier. To date, 76West has brought 59 companies to the region to pursue intensive business development and receive expert mentoring. The competition continues to grow, increase in diversity, and expand the clean energy ecosystem each year. This growth has fed the startup activity in the region, in particular in the Binghamton area, which is now home to more 76 West award winners than any other location in the region. It is now also being supported by the Binghamton Acceleration of Cleantech Entrepreneurial and Economic Development (XCEED) program, funded by \$750,000 over three years by the US Economic Development Agency's i6 incubator program.

Also in 2019, the Southern Tier REDC, in partnership with the Finger Lakes REDC and Central New York REDC, worked with Cornell University's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences and its Center for Regional Economic Advancement to launch a food and agriculture business competition called "Grow-NY" aiming to bring food and ag tech-focused startups to the region. Entrants will compete for a \$1 million

top prize, two \$500,000 awards, and four \$250,000 awards.

Further, entering Year 3 of operations, the Upstate NY I-Corps Node, a partnership of Cornell, RIT, and University of Rochester, and one of nine National Science Foundation-funded I-Corps Nodes in the USA has been working with graduate students, post docs and faculty interested in learning the entrepreneurial skills needed to commercialize technology. Partnerships and support of these efforts are in line with the regional strategy to accelerate the amount of technology commercialization within the region.

Finally, Rev: Ithaca Startup Works, an incubator in Ithaca, NY, continues to host its annual "napkin to prototype" hardware accelerator program which supports hardware startups to build prototypes. The hardware program was also awarded \$750,000 over three years from the US Economic Development Agency's i6 incubator program to take prototypes to large-scale production, and eventually to market. Along with the CleanTech Scaleup program run by Rev: Ithaca Startup Works in partnership with NextCorps in Rochester, the Southern Tier has made significant progress in 2019 towards creating a hardware manufacturing startup cluster in the region.

In the year ahead, the Southern Tier REDC innovative Culture Work Group will focus on key efforts to promote the region as a well-recognized and highly desirable place to learn, visit, live, and grow a business that include:

- **Tourism:** Building off of several collaboration sessions with the leadership of Tourism Promotion Agencies (TPA), the work group will strive to better align their work with both the regional development strategy and streamlining I LOVE NY efforts that are consistent with the efforts of regional stakeholders.
- **Broadband:** The work group identified an opportunity to bring 5G to the region's "last mile" broadband. In June/May the workgroup held a meeting with the NYS Broadband office to discuss this priority. The workgroup is working on plans to hold a 5G summit before the end of 2019.

Priority Project Descriptions

The Southern Tier REDC is recommending 26 priority projects for \$23,797,850 in state investment in the Southern Tier. The aggregated Total Project Cost of these projects is \$133,378,330 for a total leveraged investment in the Southern Tier of \$109,580,480 or a ratio of 4.6 to 1 (or 17.8% of the total project costs)

CRCC EXPANSION

CFA Number: 81894

Project Applicant: Coddington Road Community Center

Project Location: Tompkins

Total Project Cost: \$3,708,000

Description: The Coddington Road Community Center will renovate and expand their facility to increase opportunities for the local workforce by reducing barriers to employment, specifically access to quality child care, a need identified in the opportunity agenda. Coddington is located in close proximity to major job centers including Ithaca College, Cornell University and the South Hill Business Campus which has 2,000 employees. Construction of 4 permanent classrooms and a full size gym will add an additional 54 child care and 20 afterschool slots helping to address the 60% unmet need in this region.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: The Coddington expansion plan will support the region by serving approximately 54 young children and 20 school age children - helping to alleviate one of the

key Southern Tier Workforce Development needs, removing barriers to employment in the advanced manufacturing sector. This project will also include an expansion of youth employment training to develop critical skills of participating youth including communication, writing, leadership, and program specific skills that help meet the workforce investment goals as identified in the Southern Tier Strategy. As reported by the local child care resource and referral agency, Tompkins County is currently and consistently experiencing a shortage of child care, lacking up to 60% of the known need. Employers have difficulty attracting new employees to the region and lose qualified staff when there is a shortage of childcare. Our expansion will both create new jobs and support the area business community with attracting and retaining their workforce.

GLOBAL COMPETITIVENESS THROUGH AUTOMATED MANUFACTURING

CFA Number: 89975

Project Applicant: Transonic Systems

Project Location: Tompkins

Total Project Cost: \$2,207,800

Description: Transonic will increase their global manufacturing competitiveness to meet a growing worldwide customer demand for low cost, disposable, high-quality surgical-grade instruments. By deploying innovative robotics technology and advanced manufacturing materials from NYS suppliers to reduce the complexity and expense of manual processes and scale our ability to produce consistently high-quality sensors and probes at up to 20 times the current rate.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented:

This project investment strengthens the advanced manufacturing ecosystem in the Southern Tier. The planned use of NY businesses with collaborative, automated manufacturing cells will increase the skill set and value of the employee base and improve job retention in the Southern Tier.

VINES

CFA Number: 89987

Project Applicant: Volunteers Improving Neighborhood Environments Inc

Project Location: Broome

Total Project Cost: \$1,204,000

Description: Volunteers Improving Neighborhood Environments (VINES) will build a 4,000 square-foot Net Zero Energy green office using straw bale construction, a green building technique. The new building will house VINES' office and consolidate its storage spaces in downtown Binghamton within walking distance of VINES' Urban Farm.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: VINES' work connects directly to the Southern Tier REDC Plan to "Transform the Food and Agriculture Industry" through an operational farm, connecting local growers

to low/moderate income consumers, and providing workforce development in agriculture, as outlined in the regional plan. Further, this project promotes sustainability by partnering with Cornell Cooperative Extension, the Rural Health Network, farmers and others to solve challenges in the food system. VINES also provides workforce development for at risk youth, reinvests in underserved neighborhoods, and delivers locally grown food to people of all incomes. Finally, this project supports environmental justice by reducing carbon emissions and creating a model, green commercial structure in downtown Binghamton.

Project Applicant: Buckingham Manufacturing

Project Location: Broome

Total Project Cost: \$345,000

Description: Buckingham will expand their Kirkwood location through construction/renovation of their office area, manufacturing space and engineering testing area. This project also includes new machinery and equipment to support their manufacturing operations.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: This project supports the Southern Tier's strategy to build the Greater Binghamton Innovation ecosystem and invest in the advanced manufacturing industry. Through the creation of new jobs in both skilled and unskilled labor, Buckingham will be enabled to expand their market share and reach new customers, making an economic investment in the local and regional community.

THE NEIGHBORHOOD DEPOT

CFA Number: 90618

Project Applicant: Racker

Project Location: Tioga

Total Project Cost: \$4,798,000

Description: The Neighborhood Depot will serve as a non-profit hub and community center through the construction of a facility in the Village of Owego. This 15,000 SF facility will host several nonprofits including; Tioga United Way, Tioga County Rural Ministry, Catholic Charities of Tompkins Tioga & Racker, and allow them to share resources, create jobs, meet community needs and act as a disaster recovery center.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: Part of the Owego's downtown revitalization strategy, this facility will expand the workforce of nonprofits in Tioga County. Organizations will save significant overhead expenses and will allow for increases in program offerings and staff including early childhood services, residential programs and self-directed services. The project aligns with the regional strategy to promote the Southern Tier's innovative culture by improving the quality of life for residents, and revitalizing a blighted area of North Avenue in coordination with Owego's DRI vision, creating an active and vibrant downtown where tomorrow's workforce will want to visit, live and grow a business.

150 N MAIN

CFA Number: 90672

Project Applicant: Visum Development Group

Project Location: Chemung

Total Project Cost: \$1,941,845

Description: The Iszard's Building (built 1924) is located between the Chemung River and Wisner Park in downtown Elmira's West Water Commercial Historic District. This mixed-use development project will preserve and revitalize an historic building, attract visitors and new residents, and bring much-needed foot traffic and life to Main Street and the adjacent Clemens Square.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: Elmira, the Southern Tier's Round One Downtown Revitalization Initiative community, continues to attract investment, residents, innovation, and entrepreneurship. With major employers and

institutions close to the target area, the Iszard's project will provide housing for workers and space to retain and attract businesses. This project is a regional economic priority because it incorporates community revitalization, economic investment, and the creation of jobs. and builds upon the City's Downtown Revitalization Initiative (DRI) Strategic Investment Plan and targets the City's financial district for revitalization and builds upon complementary community revitalization efforts including redevelopment of the closed Lake Street Bridge into a pedestrian bridge with a Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) grant and DRI Funding.

TYOGA CONTAINER EXPANSION PROJECT

CFA Number: 90955

Project Applicant: Tyoga Container

Project Location: Steuben

Total Project Cost: \$26,329,470

Description: Tyoga Container is a 49-year-old company that customizes packaging and shipping solutions for commercial customers through the manufacture of corrugated boxes, corrugated dunnage and pallets. The company would like to relocate its pallet and dunnage divisions from Pennsylvania to a former foundry site in Painted Post, a site that has not seen commercial activity since a former foundry closed in 1986. Tyoga will develop new manufacturing and warehouse space and purchase manufacturing equipment. This location will allow the company to double its current operating capacity through warehouse storage, improved production flow and additional manufacturing lines outfitted with state-of-the-art equipment. This expansion will support new customers coming from Canada and Mexico.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: This project links the State's Tradeable Sectors strategy with the region's Advanced Manufacturing priority. The Southern Tier's plan notes that manufacturing is the third largest employment sector in the region. Tyoga Container will add manufacturing jobs using state-of-the-art equipment in support of this priority industry. Supporting the Tradeable Sectors initiative, the project will allow for the expansion of international exports through sales of air bags and bulk bags to Mexico and Canada. In addition, Tyoga is a supply-chain business for local companies such as Corning Incorporated and Anchor Glass, thereby creating local connections and strengthening a key regional industry cluster. Further, the property is listed as "Strategic Site C" in the Brownfield Opportunity Area approved in 2017, which notes that redevelopment could "... transform the economy of Painted Post."

UPSTATE CAMPBELL EXPANSION

CFA Number: 91337

Project Applicant: Upstate Farms Cheese LLC

Project Location: Steuben

Total Project Cost: \$11,400,000

Description: Upstate Niagara purchased the Campbell facility in 2017 and currently produces 1,000,000 pounds of Italian cheeses weekly. The existing product lines are mozzarella, string cheese, ricotta, impastata, and fresh curd. The company is planning to increase production volume by 16 million pounds by the end of 2023 by investing in modernization and equipment upgrades for its mozzarella, ricotta, and fresh curd production lines. The company will also install a third String Cheese packaging line and a bulk mozzarella packing line that will allow them to be more competitive in the pizza cheese supply chain.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: The Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council has set the goal to have the region be a world-recognized leader in agriculture technology and serve as a key food supplier for the East Coast of the United States. Based on the 2016 Annual Summary of New York State Dairy Statistics, Upstate Farms Cheese produced approximately 16% of the Italian Cheeses manufactured in the state. This proposed project is expected to increase production at the plant by 16M pounds annually, increasing production by 30% resulting in an additional 175M pounds of milk needed on an annual basis- making the the facility a major outlet for Upstate NY's milk supply.

CHENANGO MEDICAL NEIGHBORHOOD - PHASE 1.2 - AMBULATORY SERVICES REDESIGN

CFA Number: 92066

Project Applicant: UHS Chenango Memorial Hospital

Project Location: Chenango

Total Project Cost: \$17,000,000

Description: Chenango Memorial Hospital will work together with its community partners and UHS network to build the Chenango Medical Neighborhood (CMN). The Chenango Medical Neighborhood will consolidate and reconfigure inpatient infrastructure, enhance primary and ambulatory care service capacity, and reducing healthcare costs. Using a phased approach, this project will transform ambulatory services, preserve critical safety-net capacity and create new space for a range of ambulatory care and social services.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: The Chenango Memorial Neighborhood will support the Southern Tier as a place for people to visit and live by assuring the availability of cutting edge, quality healthcare & preventive healthcare options. Further, CMN will collaborate with local workforce development orgs to provide continuous education (LPN, CNA, etc.) to potential underserved populations, while also providing a workplace for college graduates in the medical sciences, keeping graduates of Binghamton University, Cornell University & Syracuse University in the area.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

CFA Number: 92217

Project Applicant: YMCA of Ithaca and Tompkins County

Project Location: Tompkins

Total Project Cost: \$5,920,000

Description: The YMCA of Ithaca and Tompkins County will expand childcare services by renovating and expanding their current facility to triple childcare capacity for members and the community. Renovations include relocation of the existing childcare to a new childcare center within the facility, enhancing security and service efficiencies.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: The YMCA Childcare Expansion Project aligns with state and regional priority to invest in significant expansion of childcare opportunities in support of workforce development and jobs expansion. Located centrally in Tompkins County the project will serve a growing population of employers and employees affiliated with Cornell University, Ithaca College, Cornell real estate, local Technology Park, housing developments in nearby Lansing and Ithaca, small scale research and manufacturing companies, entrepreneurial start-ups and the existing commercial/institutional base.

SAPUTO

CFA Number: 92347

Project Applicant: Delaware County

Project Location: Delaware

Total Project Cost: \$2,996,150

Description: Saputo Dairy Foods will undertake a project to increase production efficiency, provide enhanced consumer protection and support the launch of a new ultra-filtered milk product line. These improvements will enable the plant to compete with facilities across the country for new investment and job growth, while increasing demand for NYS milk. The project entails the installation of a new milk filler and appurtenant equipment and piping necessary to support the increased production capacity and efficiency of the new equipment. The new equipment will also provide for enhanced food safety quality, while reducing the amount of water and chemicals used in the cleaning process.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented:

A primary pillar of Southern Tier Soaring is the development of the region's food and ag industry. Nearly 10% of the region's economy is derived from the food and ag industries. As stated in the URI plan, the ST "has an opportunity to scale up production to meet demand" and that "with state support to increase capacity, ST food processors could expand market share". Due to the fact that Dairy Product Manufacturing has one of the highest job multipliers of any industry in the State, the 2018 Progress Report on the URI, counts increasing the diversity of food processing as one of its top strategies and describes the expansion of processing facilities for dairy as a "game changing investment". This project will enable Saputo to increase its processing capacity and diversify its product lines, while also stimulating new demand for NYS milk.

LUPOS MEAT PROCESSING PLANT

Project Applicant: Sam A Lupo Sons Inc

Project Location: Broome

Total Project Cost: \$1,781,200

Description: Sam A. Lupo & Sons, Inc. will expand current operations by constructing a new 9,000 square foot addition designed with refrigerated work rooms and coolers as well as two loading docks to accommodate all sizes of trucks while increasing efficiencies and better employee safety. The project will also provide for greater storage area, larger and improved employee areas, and administrative offices all under one roof.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: This project supports the region's priority focus to invest in the advanced manufacturing industry and the food and agriculture industry. As agriculture and food processing become more and more high tech, automation is required to compete with other large companies. With the new building, more space and the ability to grow the business, Lupo's will be positioned to capture more market share from larger, out of state companies and have the capacity to serve more of the East Coast, which is part of the plan.

I.D. BOOTH EXPANSION PROJECT

CFA Number: 93309

Project Applicant: I.D. Booth, Inc.

Project Location: Chenango

Total Project Cost: \$1,125,308

Description: I.D. Booth, an Elmira- based wholesale supplier of plumbing, heating, industrial, steel, and electrical supplies will build a new warehouse to serve as their company headquarters (replacing one completely lost in a fire last year) and relocating its HVAC inventory to improve efficiency and flow of customer order fulfillment. The company will also develop an ecommerce website and mobile app for customer convenience as well as improving cybersecurity. A new e-commerce website and mobile app will allow customers such as Cornell University,

Ithaca College, Corning Inc., Hilliard Corporation, Kennedy Valve, and Mills Electric, strengthening the local supply chain for this industry.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: Located in the Elmira Downtown Revitalization Initiative (DRI) area, this project supports the revitalization efforts through development of a new warehouse that complements the beautification and revitalization of Elmira, supporting placemaking, bringing to the interior and exterior a clean, modern appearance supported by technology.

AIRPORT CORPORATE PARK CHILD CARE CENTER

Project Applicant: Country Kids Childcare Center LLC

Project Location: Chemung

Total Project Cost: \$2,000,000

Description: This project will expand an existing NYS Licensed Day Care, Country Kids Childcare Center, LLC, which is located adjacent to over 15 companies doing business in Airport Corporate Park in Big Flats. The current location is not large enough to expand the center so this project includes acquisition of a 4.25 acre parcel of land to build per local/state codes and per the NYS Day Care regulations. The center will be on the Chemung County Transit's Airport Corporate Park bus route.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: This project aligns with the state and regional goal to identify child care needs and develop potential solutions. Specifically, this project will provide greater access to quality child care services and address the needs identified by employers located within Airport Corporate Park. It is anticipated that other employers in the county will partner on this project.

41-43 COURT STREET RENOVATION ESD

Project Applicant: Johnson-Schmidt Associates, Architects

Project Location: Broome

Total Project Cost: \$3,851,201

Description: The proposed project for 41-43 Court Street in downtown Binghamton will renovate the four-story building that was once home to a fraternal society, called the Improved Order of Red Men — formerly known as Sons of Liberty, a secret society of colonists formed after Native American tribes, that initially operated in resistance to the English Crown. Upon completion, the building will be a restored

epicenter of entertainment that includes a two-screen movie theatre, a public venue for arts and culture, a maker's space for local artisans and two residential units for affordable downtown living.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: This project supports the regional priorities to build the Greater Binghamton Innovation Ecosystem through rehabilitation and revitalization of an historic building.

AFTON WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM

Project Applicant: Village of Afton

Project Location: Chenango

Total Project Cost: \$10,700,00

Description: The Village of Afton residents and commercial users currently utilize on-site wastewater systems that are failing and overflowing in wet weather and/or are outdated according to current regulations. This project will create a safe and efficient wastewater system throughout the entire village, eliminating the contamination of the local storm water system and surrounding water ways. The project will focus on the northwest side of the Village where the majority of the commercial and residential areas are located.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: This project will allow for the economic growth and development of the Village of Afton by improving the wastewater system, by repairing and improving deteriorated infrastructure to support economic growth. Improving the wastewater system will enable a lower wastewater maintenance costs of the overflowing and outdated systems, improving the capacity of commercial development and growth. This project will clean up the local water ways and greatly improve the overall health and quality of living throughout the Village of Afton, in turn drawing new businesses and residents to the village, creating job opportunities and revitalizing the local economy.

CREATING A DIVERSE REDUNDANT AND RESILIENT HIGH CAPACITY FIBER NETWORK

Project Location: Chemung, Schuyler, Steuben, Tioga, Tompkins

Description: STN will build redundant loops of fiber in five counties across the Southern Tier utilizing nine diverse routes. These routes will close existing vulnerabilities in the STN fiber backbone to address critical infrastructure vulnerabilities to areas that currently do not have access to reliable high-speed broadband and strengthen middle mile broadband network adding 83.5 miles of middle mile fiber.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: This project supports downtown revitalization through development of a strong and reliable network. The proposed redundancy loops will ensure that both Schuyler County (Watkins Glen) as well as the City of Elmira are no longer vulnerable to breaks in the system. Further, reliable broadband will ensure innovation and automation in both advanced manufacturing and agriculture.

CORNING INCORPORATED TALENT RETENTION INITIATIVE CHILD CARE

Project Location: Steuben

Total Project Cost: \$2,500,000

Description: This project will retrofit of an existing building to provide 36 additional infant and toddler day care seats for Corning Incorporated employees.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: Access to affordable, quality child care is necessary for the recruitment of the world's top talent, in order to support

working parents and their contribution to the economic growth of the community, region, and state. This project will seek to do that for Corning Incorporated employees. As one of the region's largest employers, Corning will provide leadership and serve as a model for employer-funded child care.

MIDWESTERN PET FOODS 2020

Total Project Cost: \$589,680

Description: Midwestern Pet Foods will undertake a project to expand operations and make their processes more efficient to serve a growing customer base. Investments include an automated slip sheet dispenser, construction of a new storage structure on the east end of the facility, and a new main-hall roof.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: This project supports the region's priorities to invest in the advanced manufacturing industry and grow the food and agriculture industry by strengthening the manufacturing operations of a growing pet food manufacturer.

RENOVATION OF FORMER AUTO SHOP INTO HOME CENTRAL DESIGN CENTER AND OUTSIDE SALES OFFICE

Total Project Cost: \$695,000

Description: This project will redevelop a former Auto Shop into a Modern Design Showroom and Sales office that houses kitchen, bath and lighting displays along with other construction samples. The design center expansion will allow Home Central to expand their customer base and market share into other states.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: The project aligns with STREDC's strategy to promote the Southern Tier's downtown revitalization efforts by renovating an underutilized structure in a blighted area of the Village, a Round 3 DRI community, and allow a multi-generational business to sustain & grow their current operation. This project will renovate an underutilized structure located in a blighted area of the Village of Owego, and directly aligns with Owego's DRI Local Planning Committee's community revitalization strategy.

DELTA MEZZANINE EXPANSION PROJECT

Total Project Cost: \$534,439

Description: Delta Engineers will build out their mezzanine area to accommodate growing service demand. This project includes the addition of partitions, wall, floor and ceiling finishes as well as required HVAC, lighting, water and plumbing infrastructure and communications and security.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: As home to one of the highest percentages of workers in STEM fields in New York State, this project will advance the development of this segment of the economy in the Southern Tier. This project also supports the state and region's priority strategy to develop the workforce of the future by building upon the region's prominence for jobs in STEM, expand in the existing market, and break into new markets.

ESTABLISHMENT OF THE BINGHAMTON BRAIN AND BODY IMAGING CENTER IN THE SOUTHERN TIER

Total Project Cost: \$10,398,639

Description: Binghamton University will partner with United Health Services (UHS) to establish the Binghamton Brain and Body Imaging Center. This center will be located at the UHS Walk-In Center in Vestal, adjacent to the university's main campus and provide the most up to date MRI imaging technology for both research and clinical applications and will improve diagnostic capabilities and the development of collaborative research projects that will lead to new treatments and therapies for the improvement of patient care.

As the two largest employers in Broome County, Binghamton University and UHS continue to play a leading role in stimulating the local economy. This proposal adds infrastructure and services to the region that will make it more competitive as an innovation center for cutting edge biomedical research and training. It will contribute to consistent, long-term economic stimulus and revitalization.

DELAWARE RIVER BASIN STONE

Project Applicant: Delaware County

Project Location: Delaware

Total Project Cost: \$450,000

Description: Delaware River Basin will purchase and install a new saw line to expand their locally sourced bluestone product line into the high-end customized finished stone market. Delaware River Basin Stone, located in Deposit, NY, currently produces thermalized bluestone treads and pattern stone for wholesale and direct to contractors and stone masons. With rapid sales growth in their current conventional stone lines, DRBS is seeking to expand their product lines by offering custom cut and finished stone products.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented:

This project supports the Southern Tier's efforts to invest in the advanced manufacturing industry through "innovation in the production and sale of raw goods have significant potential to transform

the economy of the Southern Tier". Innovation in processing has led to increasing popularity of bluestone as a high-end building product for tiles, flooring and countertops. Bluestone, quarried and processed in the ST, is primarily being exported from the region to national markets. Both the URI and the strategic plan seek to bolster exports from the region. Further, because Bluestone is a product unique to the Southern Tier region, growing in popularity, that is sold predominantly on the national market, this project supports the state strategy to invest in tradable sectors. The vast majority of finished product is exported out of the region contributing toward the Southern Tier's stated URI goal of increasing regional exports by nearly 30% by 2020.

This project will enhance the mall's presence not only in our community but also help it become a destination from outside the area by driving tourism and showcasing the business, agricultural and cultural offerings of the Southern Tier and

accommodating conferences, conventions, motor coach, to name a few along with putting together packages with the different retailers in the mall.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: This project supports the Regional Economic Development Council's Strategic Plan/Upstate Revitalization Initiative Plan to support the region's innovative culture by revitalizing a centerpiece of the community and bring new tourism business that will increase both room and sales tax

FARM EXPANSION PROJECT - ESD CFA APPLICATION 2019

Description: Manhattan Country School (MCS) has operated a farm-education program since 1967 and seeks support to restore its newly acquired Lower Meeker Hollow (LMH) Farm site in Roxbury as a working farm suitable for education and community engagement. MCS will construct a large addition to the existing farmhouse, including a learning kitchen, dining room, five student bedrooms, an intern suite, covered outdoor spaces, and a textile studio, as well as complete restoration and repair of the existing barn. Spaces are multi-use, accommodating student and adult education/training. The addition will use passive

solar gain for heating, gather natural light, blend with the natural environment, and be constructed of materials that ensure a small carbon footprint.

Link to Goal or Strategy Being Implemented: This project support the regional priority to grow the food and agriculture industry by providing exposure to students on sustainable agricultural practices at the MCS Farm, which will encourage some to pursue further study or careers in life sciences, agriculture and the food system, as well as maintain and promote the community's agricultural legacy.

Beer Tree will renovate the space and purchase machinery and equipment for both retail and distribution to major cities.

Beer Tree will brew a variety of craft beer which will be distributed throughout the state, and this project will enable them to continue to grow their market. Local hops will be purchased from NY Hop Guild and Beer Tree will source malts from within New York.

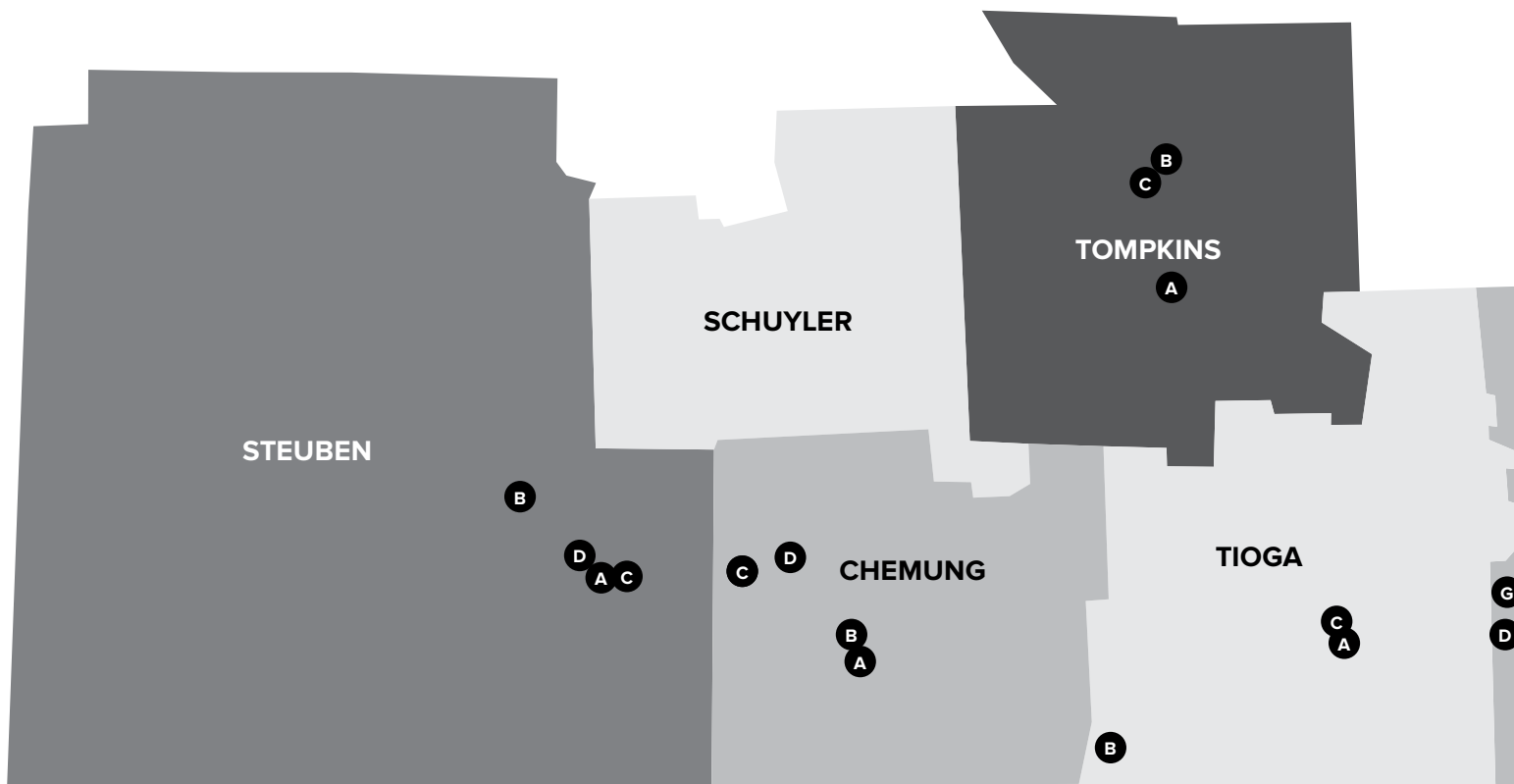

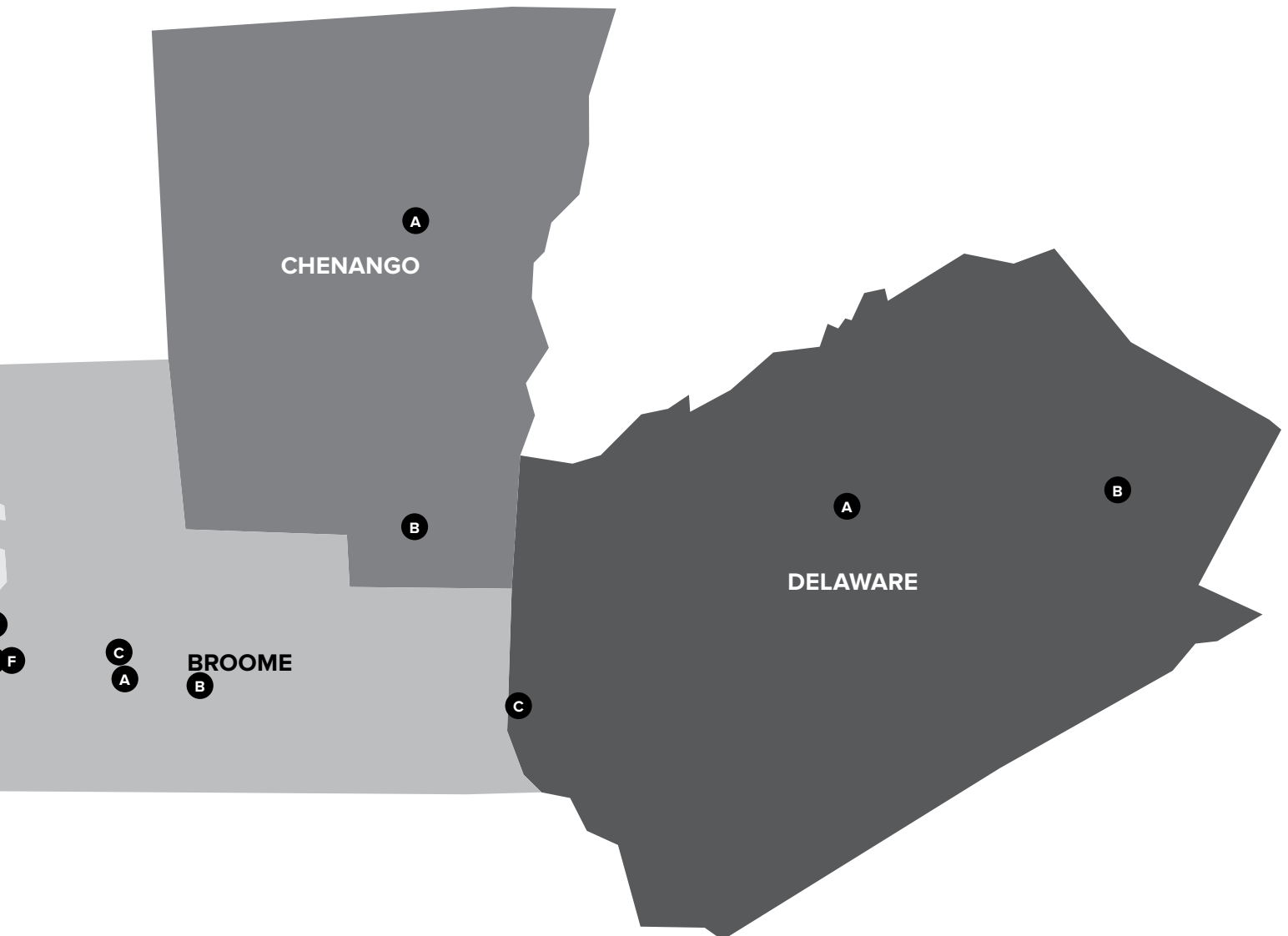

Public Outreach and Engagement

The Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council recognizes the importance of engaging the community and acquiring the support and participation of community leaders such as elected officials chamber of commerce leaders, and nonprofit boards of directors. In 2019, the council continued to expand on its efforts to reach all members of the public including underserved communities and traditionally underrepresented applicants and geographic areas.

In addition to the fourteen (14) regional leaders appointed by the governor that sit on the council that includes local government officials and county legislators, there are ninety (90) members of the work groups representing local government, community leaders, and industry.

The Southern Tier REDC held sixteen (16) public meetings this year, including four (4) REDC meetings, twelve (12) work group meetings, two (2) Consolidated Funding Application (CFA) workshops in Watkins Glen and Delhi that together welcomed seventy-one (71) members of the public to discuss the CFA process, programs, share best practices, and field questions.

Southern Tier REDC members and staff conduct meetings, presentations, and workshops throughout the year in order to learn about potential opportunities in communities throughout the region, share existing and new information about programs, services, and other resources among various state agencies, and be positioned to more effectively implement the regional strategy.

In their roles as co-chairs of the Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council (STREDC), Harvey Stenger and Judy McKinney-Cherry and staff hold regularly scheduled and as-needed meetings related to economic development projects and REDC initiatives with state, county and municipal leaders. This proactive approach enables timely information exchange and allows the co-chairs to keep pace with economic development progress in the region and its communities. Public input into this process is integral to the success of a regional, bottom-up, economic development strategy.

This effort also includes a robust outreach strategy designed to encourage participation in the Downtown Revitalization Initiative. This year, the Southern Tier received six (6) applications from communities across the region that were well positioned to leverage the \$10 million award to transform their community into vibrant neighborhoods to attract young professionals, families, and retirees alike. Through this collaborative council review, applications were scored through a blind process, and the top three communities were invited to present their downtowns to the full council for consideration. After discussion and voting, one community was recommended to the Governor for consideration of this award.



PART SIX

Downtown Revitalization Plan Round Four

The City of Hornell, located on the Western border of Steuben County, has a rich history as a commercial center for neighboring communities within a 30-mile radius. Shadowed by the beautiful wooded hills of the Canisteo Valley, Hornell’s downtown is highlighted with a wide Main Street, Victorian style lighting, and historic buildings.

The Hornell DRI boundaries include all of Broadway, Main Street from Center Street moving west to end at the Allen Street intersection, and Seneca Street from Main Street, travelling south to the Genesee Street intersection. This targeted area was chosen by a local committee for its central location that is easily accessible by both residents and neighboring

communities. NYS Route 36 runs north-south across Main Street and NYS Route 21 brings traffic from the west and becomes Main Street. The proposed boundaries are entirely within the existing Business Improvement District, which was established by the city in 1994, as well as the existing “Neighborhood Overlay”.

The City of Hornell was selected by the Southern Tier REDC as the Downtown Revitalization Round 4 community due to its compact boundary, ability to capitalize on prior private and public investments such as the new St. James Hospital, recent job growth due to expansions with transportation manufacturers Alstom and TTA Transitair, attractive physical environment that include revitalized historic buildings and a robust maple tree stewardship program, quality of life policies resulting from a dynamic online comprehensive plan, regular public input on the development of their proposal through a series of open planning meetings, and demonstrated readiness for an investment of this nature due to their experienced municipal staff, business improvement district, main street projects, and identified opportunities for DRI support.

Hornell was recently selected as a Federal Opportunity Zone based on the recommendation of the Southern Tier Regional Economic Development Council. This federal program encourages private investment in low-income urban and rural communities. The DRI and the opportunity zone designation will work together to reconnect distressed areas and assist with revitalization of the urban core.

Additionally, Hornell's Business Improvement District (BID) is organized and operated by a board of property and business owners (Hornell Partners for Growth) to enhance the economic vitality of the downtown commercial area. Together with the DRI Local Planning Committee, the City will realize several of the REDC's goals set forth in the Southern Tier Soaring plan (as well as state strategies) including:

- Invest in the Advanced Manufacturing Industry (Tradable Sectors): DRI projects will leverage past investment in companies such as Alstom to support growth associated with the City's advanced transportation industry cluster, strengthening the advanced manufacturing ecosystem of the Southern Tier.
- Promote the Southern Tier's Innovative Culture (Innovation): Many successful artists and art professors live in the City of Hornell and the City's robust arts scene also supports two artist-in-resident live/work/gallery buildings on Seneca Street and the Broadway Union arts incubator, strengthening the region's tourism and community assets and using them to promote the region to visitors, prospective talent, and investors. Additionally, recent

investments in projects such as St. James Hospital and St. James Medical Village are supporting the growing healthcare industry, the top industry employer in the region, to spur the local economy and drive growth.

According to City Code, Hornell's existing Neighborhood Overlay "includes properties, which together contribute to the historic and attractive character of particular neighborhoods in the city and to the overall health, safety and welfare of the community. Efforts to protect and enhance these properties can foster civic pride, can maintain the attractiveness of neighborhoods and can help ensure harmonious and orderly growth and development."

The built environment of downtown Hornell is a nice mix of commercial and mixed used buildings with very few vacant storefronts. Buildings in the proposed Hornell DRI area that are on the State Historic Register include the St. Ann's Federation Building, (former) US Post Office Building, and City Hall. Additionally, with the newly completed Main Street paving and accessibility updates, downtown Hornell is easily accessible and navigable. Hornell's self-funded façade program has currently covered over \$414,000 in improvements in the target area and has been very popular.

There are also several annual events that draw visitors to Hornell including one of the biggest St. Patrick's Day celebrations in the region complete with a parade, Shamrock run, and special events throughout town. Christmas is also a great time to be in downtown for "Hornell for the Holidays" which features an annual parade with Santa, real reindeer, and horse-drawn wagon rides.

The City of Hornell will build upon the immense progress that is happening with the growth in employment and private development throughout the city. Hornell has over \$300 million in private investment over the last 2 years. With the assistance of the Downtown Revitalization Initiative, Hornell plans to leverage an additional \$250 million to foster Downtown Hornell's educational, cultural, historic, artistic, recreational, dining, and retail opportunities; strengthen existing local and regional assets; create long-term value to support future generations; and provide an inclusive and sustainable downtown experience for residents, workers, students and visitors.
