THE BIG PICTURE / EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

he great news for Long Island – and we have a lot of great news – is also our greatest challenge.

It's a paradigm-shifting shortage of talented tech and other workers. And the Long Island Regional Economic Development Council is committed to confronting it the way we always have taken on challenges - strategically, collaboratively, driven by data, informed by community input, and with New York State as a supportive partner.

In 2011, when the LIREDC embarked on Governor Andrew Cuomo's innovative new approach to building the economy, Nassau-Suffolk was barely limping out of the Great Recession. The official unemployment rate was flirting with eight percent, but the real number - including those who had given up even looking for work – was far higher. In our poorest places, the toll on families was especially tragic. That's why we focused on creating as many jobs as possible with a particular focus on underserved people and places.

Since then the region has rebounded. Thanks to a strong national economy and smart local investment by the state and private businesses, a record number of Long Islanders are working – an astonishing 1.371 million with an unemployment rate of around 4 percent. We are especially pleased that since 2011 LIREDC-recommended training programs, such as the United Way of Long Island's VetsBuild, have helped halve the number of unemployed veterans. Progress like that validates the work that led to our selection as state "top performer" in five of seven years, bringing in \$570.1 million for 688 local projects – the vast majority of which have been completed or are on schedule.

1.371MILLION JOBS

Even the loss of manufacturing jobs has slowed, and gains in the innovation stalwart of advanced manufacturing have proven the worth of LIREDC's sweat and strategies. With Long Island's world-class research institutions and businesses working together as never before, employment in our cluster-of-choice - life sciences - account for an out-sized 27.7% of the state's total employment in that sector. More meaningfully, the 3.1% life sciences job growth rate on Long Island since the LIREDC began its work seven years ago has outpaced the state. Pharmaceutical manufacturing, a key feeder to the life sciences pipeline, has added the most jobs in this cluster – jobs that pay above the regional average.

highly-trained From engineers, nurses and programmers to unskilled laborers and other lowwage workers, Long Island is again a land of opportunity for upward mobility in every community.

investing tens of millions of dollars specifically in the selfsufficiency of our poorest communities - by creating a credible Opportunity Economy for all - it's not just the underserved in Wyandanch, Huntington Station and other Opportunity Agenda locations that have benefited: The entire region has risen on the wings of such success.

So what's not to like? And why do we still need state support?

The biggest problem for Long Island - one of several with which we continue to grapple – is a shortage of people qualified to fill the jobs

especially We're lacking scientists. the engineers, technicians and others essential to our strategy – our dream of transforming Long Island an international center into bio-technology, advanced for manufacturing and other knowledgebased industries. By stifling growth and innovation, this "skills gap" is both a short- and long-term threat to our economy. And that's why the LIREDC is focused on proven training and education programs – beginning even before high school – to create a pathway to prosperity for workers and businesses.

The shortage has inspired some businesses L to be aggressive and creative. Dealertrack, a software developer for auto dealers, "is using yoga, a gleaming new North Hills headquarters and even indoor cricket to lure tech talent," according to Newsday. "That package includes a fourth-floor terrace, huge video walls at the entrance and in the auditorium, and a basketball court that can be repurposed for volleyball, yoga and — in an effort to appeal to tech-savvy recruits from the Indian subcontinent — an indoor version of cricket."

To keep the 550-employee Dealertrack on Long Island, the State and Nassau County provided \$19 million in incentives. That's a collaborative measure of the commitment to expand our innovation ecosystem and provide career opportunities to an ethnically and economically diverse array of workers, including many who might otherwise take their skills to Manhattan and elsewhere.

But solving the skills puzzle overall isn't just a matter of helping a handful of promising employers and connecting a few workforcetraining pieces; that's not how the LIREDC approaches economic development.

We have learned that each of the state's strategic pillars – innovation, place-making, workforce development and tradeable sectors - needs to be viewed as a single supporting structure. Just as the "hip bone's connected to the thigh bone" in the old spiritual, we know that we can't create an innovation ecosystem without more topflight workers, especially bright, energetic Millennials. But we also know that they won't come in the droves we need – not when their skills are being sought around the world unless we build affordable rentals clustered in "cool downtowns" with public transportation and other urban-like amenities. And we know that building higher above ground isn't possible without taking care of business below ground - that least sexy of infrastructure necessities, a sturdier sewer system.

"Millennials want to live in a downtown area," Governor Cuomo said recently at the announcement of our third Downtown Revitalization recipient, the majority Latino hamlet of Central Islip. "They don't want to sit in a car. They want to be able to walk to a restaurant. They want to be able to walk to the train. They want to be able to walk to a cafe. That's how they are oriented."

Unfortunately, the region has a housing gap that tracks the skills gap. A recent study by the New York City planning agency showed that since the turn of the century Long Island has created 110,000 new jobs but only 60,000 housing units. That compares poorly to the rest of downstate; so too does our percentage of rentals to overall housing stock. And even with a rise in commuting from the city providing some new workers, that's not a formula for sustainable economic growth.

But our efforts to grow affordable rentals has been paying off. "Efforts undertaken by the council to add to the region's affordable multiunit housing stock may have played a role in slowing the out-migration of Long Islanders," according to an analysis prepared for the LIREDC. "The region ranks among the highest in the state in population retention, second to Western New York."

"connected-to" token, the care we have spent building up our downtowns and providing waste treatment also has helped us realize strategic goals in preserving existing open space and protecting our valuable natural assets - the bays and beaches, the farms and forests – that millions of visitors from around the world find so alluring. The nearly \$6 billion spent by tourists – the highest in the state outside New York City – not only goes into paychecks and profits but into government coffers as sales taxes. Along with Gov. Cuomo's property tax cap, the revenue, in turn, eases the local tax burden that funds the brunt of critical services, such as police and healthcare.

Thus, our "secret sauce" for a strong. sustainable economy is in nurturing a virtuous, self-reinforcing cycle of growth. And while our work groups again focused intently on the strategic pillars within their purview, the council itself is mindful of their interdependencies and the need to strengthen the institutional relationships they represent. More and more, educators at every level are collaborating with businesses so their students have the training to step on the production floor or research lab of a cutting edge company. More

and more, major research institutions – such as Cold Spring Harbor Lab, Brookhaven National Lab, Northwell Health, Stony Brook University and others – are working together to commercialize discovery that can create jobs and save lives.

More and more, our innovation ecosystem has been enriched by the engagement of secondary and even primary school educators, especially the three "career-oriented" Boards of Cooperative Educational Services, who now are sitting at the planning tables with representatives from our community colleges, universities, other research labs and the businesses hungry to hire their students. Yes, the "hip bone" of a new robotics camp for "tweens" is connected to the "thigh bone" of a Big Data engineering curriculum for PhDs – both of which, and others on the continuum of collaboration, we've funded.



But, still, there are problems – beyond the fresh one of jobs going begging. While our growth is strong, some other regions of the state have grown faster. Although we have seen a sea change in the willingness of local governments and institutions to work together – instead of at cross purposes as was common before the LIREDC – there is still too much nay-saying and NIMBYism that impedes progress. And even in the midst of renewed prosperity – even despite our obsessive focus on underserved communities – the poverty rate of 6.7 percent (in 2016) is the highest since the Great Depression.

That's why it's critical that the state continue to see Long Island as worthy of its economic investment dollars. And as the 80 percent success rate for our projects indicates, we will make good on our promise to spend these dollars wisely.

One continuing reason for our success cannot be overstated: The quality and commitment of the hundreds of volunteers on the Council and its work groups. The members mirror the transformative new diversity in "America's First Suburb," a mix of various racial and professional backgrounds who collectively spend thousands of hours meeting with the public and elected officials, reevaluating LIREDC strategies and advocating for the region. This helps explain why this year applications for state support rose four percent on Long Island, while the rest of the state dropped four percent. The businesses respect us and trust the process. As stewards of the local economy, the LIREDC has remained available to help local governments meet Governor Cuomo's desire to create economies of scale through shared services. Additionally, Council and work group members – as well as the skillful and dedicated ESD staff - have generated a critical mass of support for major projects not directly related to the LIREDC, such as the LIRR Third Track.

But our main objective is to learn from the past, from the many successes and few failures, and look to the future. That's why we are excited about our Round Eight Priority Projects that both advance our strategies for the Innovation, Placemaking, Workforce Development, Tradeable Sectors and Natural Assets/Tourism pillars and – most importantly – tie them together to synergize Long Island as a job-generating engine of growth for all New Yorkers.



1) GENERAL ECONOMIC INDICATORS

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
Since 2011, Long Island's gross regional product grew by an average of 3.1% per year. In 2016, the region grew by 3.3%, outpacing the state's 1.8% growth. Global exports from the region grew by \$554.6 million between 2011 and 2016. The regional economy added over 89,200 jobs, more than 5,600 new firms and \$13.2 billion in additional wages between 2011 and 2017.

Excluding New York City, Long Island had the highest private sector wages in the state at \$57,489 in 2017. After several years of declines, the employment in the public sector has increased slightly by 0.3% over the last year.

GROSS REGIONAL PRODUCT



As more unemployed residents and formerly discouraged workers found work, the region's unemployment rate fell to 4.4% in 2017 from 7.2% in 2011 while our labor force grew.

While Long Island prides itself on its highly skilled and educated workforce, 8.6% of the population aged 25 to 64 do not have a high school education. Despite a strengthening labor market and better job prospects, 5,000 more Long Islanders without a diploma dropped out of the labor market since 2012.

VETERAN UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

Thanks to training programs funded by REDC grants, such as the VetsBuild project through the United Way of Long Island, the number of unemployed veterans has more than halved since 2012.

LABOR FORCE EMPLOYMENT BY AGE GROUP

The increasing number of older workers is one of the most significant changes occurring in Long Island's economy, affecting every industry in the region. Slow overall population growth combined with an aging population can limit future economic growth. Since 2012, Long Island's population increased by only 1.2%. While the number of residents aged 55 and over increased by 73,100, or 9.2%, the cohort aged 25 to 44, which includes millennials, decreased by 16,800. Data show that the region's older population are working longer. The percentage of 55 to 64 year olds in the labor force increased from 70.7% in 2012 to 71.7% in 2016, and the percentage of people aged 65 and older in the labor force increased from 20.5% to 21.5%. Although the percentage of Millennials in the labor force decreased by 2.4% since 2012, the number employed increased slightly by 0.2%.

SECTOR DATA

ADVANCED MANUFACTURING

Provide the sector is shrinking in terms of employment and number of firms, the pace of job loss has been slowing in recent years. In fact, companies across a variety of industries have been reporting they are hiring but are having difficulty finding skilled workers. In order to attract such workers, annual wages have been increasing. Industry wages rose 5.3% between 2011 and 2017 and the sector's average annual wage – \$74,110 in 2017 – is among the highest on Long Island across sectors. Pharmaceutical manufacturing has been the largest job generator in the region adding nearly 1,200 jobs over the last six years.

LIFE SCIENCE

ong Island's world-class research institutions and businesses are an integral part of the region's economy. Employment in the life sciences accounts for 27.7% of the state's total employment in that sector, and 3.1% job growth in that sector between 2011 and 2017 has far outpaced the state. Pharmaceutical manufacturing, a major player in the life sciences pipeline, has added the most jobs in this cluster. Jobs pay above the regional average and total wages increased 10.7% since 2011.

FOOD AND AGRICULTURE

he burgeoning food cluster on Long Island continues to grow, adding over 1,200 jobs since 2011. The nearly 8% growth in firms may be attributed to the growing number of small businesses with ethnic and other specialty products, which have been supported by investments in necessary infrastructure to help the food cluster ecosystem. Total wages have increased by 25.7%, faster than the job growth rate, indicating the addition of higher paying jobs.

2) QUALITY OF LIFE INDICATORS

hile Long Island's economy is doing well, poverty remains a significant challenge to the region. Compared to New York State as a whole, overall poverty levels on Long Island are lower, but have increased from 6.0 percent in 2011 to 6.7 percent in 2016. This is the highest level of poverty in the region in nearly 60 years. The federal poverty level threshold is \$27,950 for a family of four, which does not take into account Long Island's high cost of living. Since the Affordable Care Act was enacted in 2010, however, fewer residents lack health insurance than ever before. The regional uninsured rate declined from 9.5 percent in 2012 to 7.1 percent in 2016.


Long Island's tourism industry, which includes world-class outdoor and indoor recreational opportunities and an abundance of cultural and historic sites, enhances quality of life for all residents. Visitor spending rose by 3.0 percent between 2015 and 2016, and pumped an additional \$5.6 billion into the regional economy.

MIGRATION

Forts undertaken by the council to add to the region's affordable multi-unit housing stock may have played a role in slowing the out-migration of Long Islanders. The proportion of Long Islanders who stayed increased from 97.5% in 2015 to 97.6% in 2016 and the region ranks among the highest in the state in population retention, second to Western New York. Meanwhile, 3,400 fewer individuals left New York State, an 8.3% decrease from 2015. A relatively strong New York City economy and potential for higher wages attracted more Long Island workers in 2016. The number of Long Islanders who work and live in the same region of the state decreased by 1.2% between 2015 and 2016. 77.3% of Long Islanders work in-region.

With nearly one in five residents working in New York City, mass transit is critical to the health of the region's economy. Long-overdue infrastructure improvements in the LIRR are necessary to keep commute times from growing. Long Island had the second longest average commute time in the state, at 33.7 minutes in 2016, unchanged from the previous year.

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
3) KEY REGIONAL INDICATORS



HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATES






One of our signature strategic achievements since 2011 is the boost in engineering enrollment, part of a trend that has seen more Long Islanders earn degrees in all disciplines. The 250 percent overall increase in engineering students, spread across four institutions of higher learning, put a serious dent in the shortage of qualified engineers that was holding back key economic sectors from realizing their potential.



The Region's personal income and housing values continue to rise.






We also have seen an encouraging uptick in the number of Millennials choosing to call Long Island home, as well as affordable downtown housing units built. At the same time, however, the inflation-adjusted decline in wages among 25-34-year olds – as opposed to personal income gain in all cohorts – has made life harder for these aspiring young professionals to make a go of it in our region. In fact, more than 40 percent of them are living with parents. That's not a sustainable situation, for families and communities. Further compounding the problem is the imbalance between the increase in jobs created and the number of housing units built. Long Island is creating more jobs than housing thus making it more difficult to attract those sought after millennials to the region.

Employment in the construction industry has increased by 34% from 2011-2017 and average wages have increased by 17% in the same time frame.



Pharmaceutical manufacturing remains an important industry on Ll with 10,404 people employed in the industry in 2017. In 2017, hospitals alone employed 64,931 people up by 12% since 2011 and the entire healthcare industry employed 221,231 people, also up by 12%.



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Since 2011, the LIREDC's arc of accomplishment has spanned the length of Long Island, insuring that every community and sector has enjoyed the benefits of billions in state and private investment. We have faithfully abided by our consensus-driven strategies, but have remained vigilant and nimble enough – listening to our stakeholders – to meet shifting challenges. After Super Storm Sandy destroyed thousands of businesses, for example, the LIREDC pivoted to target additional resources on economic development aspects of recovery.

We've always taken the long view. We are continuously promoting cutting-edge proposals with immediate payoffs in jobs and products, but the LIREDC has been diligent – and patient – in supporting "unsexy" infrastructure, such as the sewers to support denser development, and research programs that may take years before yielding a lot of jobs and saving lives. We have also taken the synergistic view in which a project in one sector or strategic silo helped the other achieve its goals, such as affordable housing in downtowns attracting young knowledge-based workers, and environmental preservation and agricultural projects keeping the tourists coming.

The LIREDC is proud to have been ahead of the curve in confronting problems and crafting solutions. Before the state required an Opportunity Agenda, the LIREDC invested heavily in our poorest hamlet. Before we were told to identify an industry cluster, we were bringing together world-class research centers to establish biotech as the key to creating a "Silicon Island." We focused on our downtowns before the state established the Downtown Revitalization Initiative or designated "placemaking" as a goal. We took steps to close a "skills gap," particularly for minorities and veterans.

Overall, we have tried to create an Opportunity Economy so no Long Islander is left behind.

PROJECT PROGRESS SINCE 2011

BELOW ARE EXAMPLES PULLED FROM SEVEN YEARS OF JOB-GENERATING INVESTMENTS IN OUR PEOPLE AND PLACES.

PLACEMAKING

Meadows at Yaphank – In Round Three (2013), Rose Breslin Associates, LLC was awarded a \$1.5 million ESD Grant for an offsite access road and sanitary sewer pump station to facilitate a 322acre mixed use development and create 18 full time jobs. The goal is to serve thousands of scientists and technicians at Brookhaven National Lab. In Round Four (2014), the project was awarded another \$1.5 million for the construction of the main boulevard, emergency access and connector roads, first phase construction of the sewage plant, 150 residences and a 120-suite hotel. The Round Three project is complete; the Round Four project is on schedule for completion December 2019.

INNOVATION

Hofstra University Big Data and Robotics Laboratories – In Round Three (2013), with a shortage of engineers identified early on as a problem for Long Island, and with the need to expand our high-tech base into cybersecurity, biotechnology and other advanced computer-driven areas, Hofstra University was awarded a \$2 million ESD Grant to support the expansion of its School of Engineering and Applied Sciences. The funds went to creating new laboratories and classrooms focusing on Big Data and Robotics courses. Both projects are complete and the labs are supporting both educational and industrial uses, as well as inter-institutional collaborations.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Composite Prototyping Center (CPC) – In Round One (2011) the Composite Prototyping Center was awarded a \$136,000 ESD Grant to provide advanced composite technology workforce training and education programs. In June, in furtherance of our goals to attract new businesses from around the country and the world, the Plainview-based CPC became the east coast home of Abaris Training Resources, a Nevada-based company with classrooms across the country. Abaris is the largest composites training company in the world.

NATURAL ASSETS & TOURISM



Peconic Land Trust – In Round Four (2014), the Peconic Land Trust was awarded a \$1 million ESD Grant to establish the Agriculture Capital Equipment Grant Program which developed a pool of financial resources to assist farmers making capital investments. The program has helped 5 shellfish farms, 2 vineyards, and 23 agriculture farms over the last three years acquire the equipment needed to start or grow their business and meet the increasing demands for food quality and safety standards.

TRADEABLE SECTORS

D'Addario and Company – In Round Five (2015), J. D'Addario and Company was awarded a \$1 million ESD Grant to bring manufacturing functions back from Connecticut and improve efficiency through investment in new equipment. As part of this completed project the company added 27 jobs to their existing workforce of 771. The grant helped D'Addario maintain its position as a Long Island manufacturer and as one of the world's most respected producers of musical strings and other equipment.

PROJECT PROGRESS FROM PAST YEAR

2017 marked another strong year for the LIREDC. We received our fifth "top performer" designation in seven years and an overwhelming number of our marquee Priority Projects – the ones deemed most impactful and representative of our Key Strategies – not only received funding but made steady progress toward producing jobs and other economic activity. Just as important, our communities and stakeholders saw evidence of the LIREDC's "long game" – projects funded years ago that finally bore the fruit of ground-breakings, ribbon-cuttings and payroll checks. Here are several examples of our progress from the past year:

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT & DA

NASSAU COMMUNITY COLLEGE

URGENT – In Round Seven (2017), Nassau Community College was awarded a \$100,000 DOL Grant to support their URGENT Program, which provides classroom instruction and workshops to unemployed/underemployed individuals seeking field positions in the utility industry. And in a tight job market, it helps the industry fill positions with people who normally don't find their way onto utility payrolls. Industry partners include four major utilities. The first cohort of 26 women completed the program. Graduates have begun interviewing with the industry partners. A second training cohort is

planned to begin in October with a focus on veterans.

TRADEABLE SECTORS

Qosina Corp – In Round Six (2016) Qosina Corporation was awarded a \$185,000 ESD grant to create a clean room, computer warehouse management IT upgrades and facility improvements. Located in Ronkonkoma, Suffolk County this medical products distributor will create 10 jobs to their existing workforce of 111 employees. The grant aided the expansion of our burgeoning biotech cluster and increased export activity.



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PLACEMAKING

Ronkonkoma Hub - In Round One (2011), Suffolk Department of Public Works was awarded a \$4 million ESD Grant toward the design and inspection of a new 500,000 gallons per day sewage plant in the Town of Islip. Waste treatment capacity is essential to supporting transitoriented development, such as the vast project by the railroad station in Brookhaven known as The Ronkonkoma Hub and future development near MacArthur Airport. In Round Two (2012), Tritec Real Estate Co., LLC was awarded a \$1.05 million ESD Grant for sewer improvements to support the project. A groundbreaking ceremony was held in November 2017.

INNOVATION

New York Institute of Technology Cybersecurity Lab – In Round Five (2015) New York Institute of Technology was awarded a \$400,000 ESD Grant for the creation of a Cyber Security focused business incubator which will participate in StartUP NY program. This project is complete and resulted in the creation of 4 new jobs.

Stony Brook University MRI – In 2016, Stony Brook University was awarded a \$500,000 ESD Grant to support a \$4.1M investment for acquisition of state of the art pre-clinical MRI equipment to enhance innovation and biotech discovery. The MRI equipment has been installed and is operational.

TOURISM & NATURAL ASSETS

Pride on the Beach – In Round Seven (2017), the LGBT Network was awarded a \$103,125 ESD Market New York Grant to produce "Pride on the Beach," a 3-day destination Pride celebration leveraging Long Island's beaches as a natural asset to stimulate out-of- state tourism. The festival secured top-tier entertainment talent and drew more than 30,000 people from 13 States, 3 Canadian cities and one European country. The project helped us meet goals of promoting diversity and inclusion as well as tourism.



MAPPED STATUS OF PAST **PRIORITY PROJECTS**








LEVERAGE OF STATE INVESTMENT IN ALL PAST PRIORITY PROJECTS



Status of All Projects Awarded CFA Funding

s noted above, the LIREDC has been busily pursuing a collaborative, inclusive agenda for growth that has touched every town and sector. And the numbers bear that out: The 688 total CFA projects in our first seven years produced a total investment of nearly \$3 billion, leveraged at a rate of 12.5:1 with \$230 million in state funds. The publicprivate effort is projected to create or save more than 26,000 jobs, changing lives and communities. As a result of intensive attention to detail by the Council and state agency staff, about 80 percent of our awarded projects were successfully completed or well on their way.



WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

y, how our workforce world has changed in just a short time. But considering all the disruptive forces that are roiling the economy and society at large - from the world's largest hotelier that doesn't own a single room to the dominant taxi companies that don't own a single car – our relatively new employment challenges should surprise nobody. And in Round Eight, Long Island's workforce picture is considerably different than in the seven years since we developed our strategies and initiatives in Round One. The reasons run from economic cycles to demographic and social sea change. First, the recession punctured Long

> Island's of economic veneer prosperity: in a region that was often seen as recessionproof because of the reliable input of federal defense dollars. unemployment rose above 7 percent, and job creation became an urgent regional, as well as national, priority. But the recession also revealed structural problems in the training and placement

formal education. The entire island was suffering to some degree or another, but some sectors and communities knocked off stride by the devastation of Superstorm Sandy and the economic development and social services pivot to recovery efforts. Still, Long Island persevered and again began to prosper. But as the jobless rate has dropped to 4 efforts of regional stakeholders, including the LIREDC, the fundamental challenges of meeting labor needs in educated professionals. Long Island's key sectors remained. Employers had scrambled for talent,

even when unemployment was at its highest, and the LIREDC has focused on creating a pipeline – of workers and of information - that attracts, retains, and grows businesses.

s we have since our first report, Athe LIREDC saw and encouraged a connection between job creation and downtown revitalization. It was prescient and has never been more important. But creating communities that attract and retain highlyeducated workforces presents its own challenge, and here, the goals workforce development mesh of with those of placemaking. Round One coincided with the nadir of Long Island's foreclosure crisis, when the region was one of the most impacted regions in the state and the housing market was at a standstill. The market has rebounded, and construction jobs have risen by more than a third. But for it to be sustainable, this growth

IMPLEMENTATION OF WORKFORGE DEVELOPMENT STRATEGIES

TRAIN WORKERS FOR THE HIGH-TECH, HIGH-SKILL JOBS OF THE FUTURE

WHAT WE'VE DONE

In sectors such as advanced manufacturing Land healthcare, rapid technological change has required extensive skill development for new and incumbent workers alike. LIREDC has provided direct support for training, while encouraging the expansion of programs that prepare workers for new positions in growing fields. Early on the LIREDC identified the shortage of engineers as being an impediment to economic growth in the region. In response, over several years and funding cycles, the LIREDC supported engineering programs at Hofstra, Farmingdale State, Stony Brook, and the New York Institute for Technology. As a direct result, regional engineering enrollments have surged from 3,122 to 11,099 - an increase of 255% in only six years.

WHAT WE'LL DO

 γ yber security is a new emerging field C in the region – an echo of our legacy dominance in defense-related aerospace. So the LIREDC has supported projects in past rounds at Stony Brook University and New York Institute of Technology to train the future employees and entrepreneurs in various technological facets of the Cyber Security world. This year the LIREDC will continue to support programs to train the future workforce in the cutting-edge field. This year projects at both Hofstra University and Suffolk County Community College are recommended for funding to create new labs and classroom space to teach related skills to the next-generation of high-tech students.


FILLING THE SKILLS GAPS BY CONNECTING BUSINESS TO ACADEMIA

WHAT WE'VE DONE

IREDC work group members and regional Labor market intermediaries have established and fostered closer relationships between businesses and universities. These relationships have become particularly important in advanced manufacturing, as the sector has become more technologicallyforward, capital-intensive, and reliant on smaller, high-wage workforces. The Workforce Development Institute ("WDI") has invited regional STEM university and college faculty to tour facilities so that they can teach the skills and knowledge necessary to produce job-ready graduates. Farmingdale State College has formed partnerships with local pharmaceutical manufacturers, who have explained Good Manufacturing Process (GMP), reviewed syllabi, recommended courses, and guided the design of stackable credentials. These students meet the needs of a growing subsector that has received State capital investments to update equipment and expand operations. These investments have contributed to a recent 13% increase in regional employment in the field of pharmaceutical manufacturing.

WHAT WE'LL DO

The Workforce Development Work Group will continue to foster future partnerships between business and academia by continuing monthly meetings where skills gaps are regularly discussed and analyzed. The ESD staff will continue to work closely with the WDI and the Manufacturing Technology Resource Consortium ("MTRC") at Stony Brook University to connect businesses with the appropriate partners to assist in training their employees. The LIREDC is supporting training programs not only between companies and educational institutions but within those companies.



ROBOTICS CAMP

Some kids go to camp to swim, shoot hoops or just get away from their annoying older/younger brother/sister.

Not the middle and high school students whose parents (and, yes, some of those same siblings) watched them coax imaginative electronic creatures through an obstacle course and several tasks. These students attended a new Robotics Camp hosted by the LIREDC-supported Composite Prototyping Center and sponsored by the Manufacturing & Technology Resource Consortium (MTRC), the regional NY Manufacturing Extension Partnership (MEP) center for Long Island.

"In eight to ten years, your kids will be the next generation of scientists and engineers," said Dr Imin Kao, executive director of the MTRC.

Twenty-four students received scholarships (as well as "Engineers in Training" t-shirts) to the two-week camp, developed with a STEM-based foundation and hosted by the Composite Prototyping Center (an IACMI hub).

"What I like most about the camp is that it is innovative, interesting and fun," said Alex Alameda, a 13-year-old student from Farmingdale. "It introduces you to a new way of doing robotics and I've learned how to approach problems in different ways and with an optimistic mindset."

The students, who came from a wide range of school districts in Nassau and Suffolk counties, learned and practiced Engineering Design, Practical Electronics, and Microcontroller Programming while working collaboratively in a team to design, build, and program an autonomous and Bluetooth-controlled robot. In addition to the t-shirts, the students received a take-home robotics kit and achievement certificate at conclusion of the camp.

"This STEM-focused robotics camp is a workforce development project," said Dr. Kao. "This program leverages their enthusiasm and cultivates their interest and aims to keep them on that path to the development of a future workforce."

"We feel this pilot program was a success," says Cynthia Colón, Program Manager for MTRC. "The students were engaged throughout and excited to demonstrate what they developed. Our goal is to run this annually."

And perhaps produce Long Island's next Nobel Prize winner?

INCREASE STEM EDUCATION

WHAT WE'VE DONE

The LIREDC and the work group members **I** have recognized that it is imperative to start teaching STEM at a young age well before college, and even before high school. Young minds need to be engaged early. LIREDC has supported numerous STEM education programs for youth - from the Long Island STEM Hub in Round One to last years' Center for Science, Teaching and Learning to create Community Stem Centers in ten underserved communities. LIREDCsupported programs have touched countless young minds. These children, participating early in everything from coding classes to robotics camps, will become the pipeline of future innovation talent in the region.

WHAT WE'LL DO

The LIREDC will continue its streak of **L** supporting STEM education this year with two new projects. We Connect The **Dots STEAM Research & Education Center** will offer training programs in science, technology, engineering, digital arts and math to K-12 students and also community and industry partners throughout the region. The Sunrise STEAM Shack will create a state-of-the-art STEAM camp facility in Wyandanch to teach children with cancer and their siblings valuable tech skills that can translate to future career opportunities. Our goal is to create one educational and innovation ecosystem that starts early and lasts a lifetime in productive employment.

TRAINING MORE HEALTHCARE PROFESSIONALS

WHAT WE'VE DONE

IREDC investments have responded to Lgrowing labor demand in the healthcare and hospitality sectors. Long Island's private healthcare and social assistance businesses added over 24.000 jobs from 2011 and 2017. a 12 percent increase. Hospitals account for about 30 percent of the sector's total employment and job growth, and sharp increases in average wages at hospitals led the sector. The LIREDC supported training programs to update the medical coding and billing skills at South Nassau Communities and **NYU-Winthrop**; renovate nursing training facilities at Adelphi, Molloy, and St. Joseph's Universities; and train certified nursing assistants through public and private providers. These new capital investments and training programs have proven essential as hospitals, urgent care, and satellite providers expand their services throughout the region.

WHAT WE'LL DO

This year the LIREDC continues to support healthcare employment – the most robust part of our economy – through a High Tech Anatomy Teaching Laboratory at Hofstra University to train future healthcare professionals, a new medical school at NYU Long Island School of Medicine at Winthrop Hospital and a new residency center at Southside Hospital to train new doctors and finally new labs at Long Island University to support its new Veterinary Medicine programs.

HELP THE UNDERSERVED AND SPECIAL POPULATIONS, INCLUDING VETERANS

SUPPORT THE HOSPITALITY INDUSTRY

WHAT WE'VE DONE

The Council has supported **I** projects since the beginning that have expanded training for special populations, recruited from under-employed and under-resourced communities, and incorporated innovative green construction and energy-efficient technology. The United Way of Long Island, for example, has received \$700,000 over four rounds of funding to train 275 veterans, youth, unemployed workers, and SNAP recipients in facilities supported by the LIREDC; most recently, 25 unemployed workers received 120 hours of training (including 40 hours of onthe-job training), and were guaranteed interviews with participating employers. These investments take the long view, they develop an enduring reservoir of skilled labor capable of building an infrastructure that meets economic development, environmental, and equity goals.

WHAT WE'LL DO

This year the LIREDC will again support projects for the underserved populations. One notable project, the Bridgehampton Child Care and Recreational Center, will provide childcare to lower income working families, a real need through out the region. Two other projects include resource centers that will provide workforce development opportunities in the communities of Wyandanch and the Village of Hempstead – namely the Wyandanch Community Resource Center and the Interfaith Nutrition Network Community Center.

WHAT WE'VE DONE

The hospitality sector has likewise **L** expanded as the economy has recovered: employment in the sector has grown by more than 19,000 jobs, a 23 percent increase from 2011. The council has funded the development of programs in tourism and hospitality management – and training for unemployed and special populations in those fields - at St. Joseph's College in Rounds Three and Five. These programs supply not just the core employers like restaurants and accommodations. which drive the bulk of job growth, but institutions like hospitals and healthcare centers, which are under increased pressure to maximize customer satisfaction.

As the healthcare and hospitality industries have expanded, workers in these sectors have enjoyed some of the fastest wage growth in the Long Island economy. In the case of hospitality workers, many of whom work at or near the minimum wage, these improvements were likely the direct or indirect effect of minimum wage increases signed into law by the governor. In several other sectors, however, job growth has not been complemented by robust real wage growth. Producing a "high-road" economy, with work that reliably provides entry into the middle class, will require cooperation and advocacy from multiple, fully-engaged stakeholders government, business, organized labor, and non-profit advocates. Economic development and the LIREDC has a role to play in achieving this, and the nexus between healthcare and hospitality is a good place to focus.

WHAT WE'LL DO

Elexibility and inter-sector relation- Γ ships have been a hallmark of the LIREDC: so has our commitment to working closely with funding recipients to ensure success and continuity, a key reason we have one of the highest completion rates in the state. That's why we will carefully monitor the unanticipated synergies between healthcare and hospitality, making sure programs funded the past few years are meeting their employment targets. Through training and technological innovation, also we will keep looking for new opportunities in hospitality and healthcare to create well-paying jobs and profits and, importantly, to serve residents in hospitals, nursing homes and other facilities where quality care is not only about comfort but life and death.

STEM

Center for Science Teaching and Learning

The results were dismal, but the response was clear and direct.

The Center for Science Teaching and Learning (CSTL) was founded in 2000 as a non-profit organization dedicated to STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) learning and literacy. The mission was clear after CSTL staff conducted a survey of science knowledge throughout Long Island, which was reported in Newsday to wide concern: Fewer than 30% of Long Islanders knew where we get our drinking water from and fewer than 40% knew that vehicles cause air pollution.

So CSTL focused its efforts on helping people understand more about the world around them through science. CSTL strives to help people understand the importance of STEM in their everyday lives by providing programs for kids and their families. CSTL administers the world's only clean technology high school design competition, sponsored by Spellman High Voltage. CSTL will now administer a new health challenges competition for Long Island students sponsored by Neurological Surgical PC.

Nationally, fewer than eight percent of young people major in STEM careers, and we need over one million to fill STEM jobs. With local businesses reporting difficulty in filling jobs, especially in tech sectors,

CTSL is opening several STEM centers across Long Island. With the help of an LIREDCsupported grant, these centers will be placed where people can learn more about STEM and the careers while having lots of fun exploring and discovering.

An important feature that was especially appealing to the LIREDC, the centers will be located in predominantly underserved areas where kids do not have the same access to STEM programs. The goal is to get the entire community engaged in STEM. Additionally, in spring 2019 CSTL will open "Dinosaurs! An Animal Adventure." This is part of instilling love for science at a very young age.

> "For Long Island's economy to get even stronger we need lots of people to fill STEM jobs," said Ray Ann Havasy, who founded and operates CTSL. "These are jobs that pay well and are involved with new discoveries every day."

INNOVATION AND INDUSTRY **CLUSTER**



n 2011, the newly appointed LIREDC members, stakeholders Land state agency staff sat in a room filling huge easel boards with our regional challenges, opportunities and proposed strategies. Each year that SWOT analysis and those issues are revisited and analyzed under the lens of a changing national and local economy and the rapid pace of new technology, discovery and demographic change. That room, full of our region's brightest and best, didn't imagine that in 2018 we would be seeing smart drones in the sky and self-driving vehicles on our roads. Some of those drones are being designed/ tested and manufactured on Long Island. Throughout these volcanic technology eruptions, the Innovation and Industry cluster Work Group has held tight to its belief that the region's bright future hinges on creating a talented pipeline of workers and bringing discovery from the lab to the shop floor.

The innovation cluster selected **I** by Long Island is life science and biotechnology. The cluster encompasses the discovery of new molecules and drugs to improve lives but also includes the development of medical devices and even the software and big data needed to churn new discovery. We support the work of Stony Brook University's Center of Advanced Technology in Biotechnology and the collaboration between Stony Brookhaven National Brook.

Laboratory, Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory, and the Feinstein Institute at Northwell Health as well as the CAT center's innovative Bio Mentor program.

Te know Innovation and Workforce Development are independent pillars of our plan, but it's clear they intersect in so many important ways, and our past and future projects reflect what is often an overlapping but clearly intended mosaic. Placemaking and Tradeable Sectors also come into play, as building an innovation ecosystem means providing appealing communities to attract the young talent for our discoverers and producers. DR. LUCILLE NICHOLS LEE FEINSTEIN INSTITUTE RESEARCHER

Cutting-edge technology not only generates jobs but can improve the quality of lives and even save them.

Take Dr. Lucille Nichols Lee and her colleagues at the Feinstein Institute for Medical Research and Northwell Health's Department of Radiation Medicine. They have identified methods to increase use of the cutting-edge cancer radiation therapy, hypofractionation, in breast cancer patients. These findings, recently published in Advances in Radiation Oncology, demonstrate that most patients with breast cancer can be treated with a type

of radiation therapy that is as effective, but has lower radiation medicine department that our adoption rate toxicity levels, compared to current treatments.

Hypofractionated radiation therapy is used in cancer patients where a higher dose of radiation is administered over a shorter timeframe. Up until recently, it was thought that hypofractionated radiation therapy was ineffective for breast cancer patients. However, randomized clinical trials proved that this therapy is comparable to other radiation therapies in effectiveness while being less toxic, both research and education. Dr.

"Hypofractionated radiation therapy is underused in the treatment of breast cancer despite equal control. less acute toxicity and similar side effects," said Dr. Lee who is at Hofstra/Northwell, helping to senior author of the study. "We found that through the produce the next, well, Dr. Lee!. development of consensus-based treatment directives and peer review of cases by faculty in Northwell's

of this therapy increased to more than 73 percent of women treated for breast cancer."

The Innovation and Discovery building L at Stony Brook University's R & D LIsland University, with campuses Park is nearly completed. Beyond biotech, we have supported the creation of cyber labs at Stony Brook and New York Institute of Technology for students and fledgling entrepreneurs to find ways to keep our financial systems and utility grids safe. We invested in SBU's Additive Manufacturing Prototyping and Applications Center to support Long Island's resurgence in advanced manufacturing. The center is open and, importantly, has these resources available to manufacturers across the state.

IREDC will support funds for Long expand five new research labs. This will support life science education programs and better position LIU for State's newest college of Veterinary Winthrop School of Medicine will be constructed within the Winthrop Research Institute in downtown Mineola – a facility we aided in earlier rounds – and will offer an innovative three-year medical program to train primary care physicians. We will also support funding for a new Center for Advanced Drug Action at Stony Brook.

Dr. Sampson is an innovative leader in creating superior disease diagnostics and drug candidates with improved efficacy. A woman-owned, pre-clinical stage company for commercialization of therapeutics and diagnostics with an emphasis on infectious disease, Chronus Pharmaceuticals, Inc. is currently based at CEWIT, a New York State Center of

Excellence at Stony Brook University dedicated to help grow technologically-innovative companies on Long Island. Revolutionizing the world of biotechnology with her work, Dr. Sampson notes the key resources available on Long Island as pivotal to her success:

"The advice, mentoring, and support from the Center for Biotechnology, the LI-Bio HUB REACH program and the Institute of Chemical Biology and Drug Discovery have been instrumental in translating our science from the laboratory into a successful start-up company," said Dr. Sampson.

Chronus Pharmaceuticals, Inc. is currently establishing a diagnostic to detect tuberculosis (TB) disease stage in small volume blood samples from pediatric patients using an antibody-based assay. One-third of the world's population has TB infection and children account for approximately 10% of the total TB burden. Since there are currently no nonsputum-based diagnostics specific for childhood TB diagnosis, the need for such a tool is extremely high.

In addition to being a role model as a female CEO, Dr. Sampson is a teacher and mentor, serving as Interim Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and a Professor of Chemistry at Stony Brook.

INCREASE FINANCIAL RESOURCES FOR BIOTECH

WHAT WE'VE DONE

D iotech firms have a long lead until **B**success might be evident and that can make NYS and local incentives difficult to match to proposed biotech investments. Economic development agencies are under close scrutiny and measured almost exclusively by short term job creation - not something aligned with the pace of industry processes in moving from lab "bench to bedside." For that reason, our strategy

to bolster incentives and investments to support biotech was greatly augmented by the 2016 announcement by Governor Cuomo that a \$650M Life Science initiative had been funded. These funds, administered by ESD, makes available unique tax credits for life science R & D, capital for new biotech facilities, funding for new biotech accelerators – hopefully one for LI – and other competitive funding elements that more appropriately fit the needs of Long Island biotech.

WHAT WE'LL DO

IREDC leadership will continue to encourage our life science institutions including Stony Brook University, Hofstra University, Cold Spring Harbor Labs, NYU Winthrop and The Feinstein Institute to collaboratively develop a solid request for funding that meets capital needs for new biotech facilities. provides softer funding for regional biotech research and offers funds to

spur development of new biotech firms across Long Island. Our strategy here is: "Hey if you don't ask, you won't get." The key is a well thought out regionally collaborative ask with council leadership driving our request.

Research and education is the under-appreciated key to a secure nation, and Long Island is becoming a center for some of the most intriguing tech approaches.

The NSI vision and core mission are bold: to secure our homeland by researching and developing technologies and insights for trustworthy communications and computing platforms. NSI's goal is to become a world leader in research, the education of professionals, security technology, business and policy, and raising awareness. NSI spans multiple disciplines and establishes public-private partnerships to develop new holistic socio-technological solutions for securing our highly-digital societies; it engages not only in research but also in the education of professionals in defense, national and cyber-security, assurance, healthcare, and policy.

"With more top universities and national laboratories within a 25 mile radius, we have an emerging startup culture, and in closer proximity to incredible beaches than Silicon Valley," said Dr. Sion, "Long Island has become an amazing ecosystem for world-class technology research and impact. This has become obvious in many fields but especially in cyber security where significant strength has been building up over the past decade. Catalyzed by the State University of New York 2020 initiative, NSI has a world-renowned team that has raised over \$18m in research funding over the past 42 months. NSI continues its significant growth curve and more than 3 positions are available this year."

Dr. Sion's interests include Cyber-Security, Applied Cryptography, Network Security, Systems Security, Systems, Large-Scale and Cloud Computing, Green Computing, and Cost and Energy-Efficiency. Dr. Sion is a recipient of the prestigious National Science Foundation CAREER Award. Dr. Sion founded and is currently leading Private Machines Inc., a successful university spin-off startup building next generation cyber-security platforms.

In short, he is busy protecting us in ways most of us can't imagine.

WHAT WE'VE DONE

Cince 2011 we have been laser Solution of the focused on creating a homegrown workforce to supply the talent demanded by our growing tech businesses. In Rounds One and Two we supported large investments in expanding engineering enrollment at Stony Brook, Hofstra, Farmingdale State College and New York Institute of Technology. This early "bet" paid off well and each college has seen a remarkable increase in both enrolled engineering students and in graduates' ability to secure jobs in the engineering field. Prior Regional Council investments have supported new teaching labs for nurses at Adelphi, for chemistry and biology and environmental science students at a new "academic collaboratorium" at Hofstra. We will see new STEM community centers opening in our highest need communities, overseen by a prestigious privately-run science education organization, and supported by last year's award.

WHAT WE'LL DO

T *T* e are creating anatomy teaching **V** labs at **Hofstra** so life science students can learn on virtual dissection equipment and synthetic anatomical models. At Farmingdale State College we will support funding to turn a former single tenant bio space into a new multi-user facility that seeks to integrate bio curriculum students with smaller biotech companies that need interns and trained students. We will support the conversion of part of the former Dowling College into a new National Aviation Training Center that will partner with schools across the metropolitan region who need the aviation simulation equipment to train students for careers as pilots, aviation mechanics and other related fields. The new NAT center will fit well with our proud aviation heritage and create a pipeline of well-trained aviation workers.

GROW AND RETAIN BUSINESSES

WHAT WE'VE DONE

Tn Round One a \$500,000 grant was provided Lto Accelerate Long Island so the organization could distribute funds to early stage venture capital candidates. Now nearly all of the original companies are growing with some raising as much as \$3 million in follow-on funding. Clearly our most successful initiative came early on in Round One when we committed \$3 million to Amneal which has added almost 250 new jobs and is now LI's largest generic pharma company. We had similar success with Sciegen which in earlier rounds received Excelsior Jobs tax credits and added hundreds of new generic pharma jobs. In reality, ESD will work with any expanding company 365 days a year so they need not wait for a Regional Council funding round.

WHAT WE'LL DO

Reflecting the diversity of our initiatives, from fishing to machined parts, we are supporting primarily Excelsior funding for a group of companies we call our "business bundle." Though fitting in no specific strategic category, these companies will create hundreds of new manufacturing jobs. In addition, this year we are funding a facility at **SBU's Manufacturing Technology Resource Center.** It will make digital tools for smart manufacturing available to companies across Long Island who need to build prototypes or improve manufacturing processes. Other schools can send their clients to the MTRC.

WHAT WE'VE DONE

Yber Security, big data and Artificial ∠Intelligence is on the front page every day and will continue to play a role in our lives, especially national security. Long Island, with a deep talent pool of IT workers combined with a heritage in defense, can take a leadership role. We have strengths in software engineering and the region is home to existing powerhouse companies like CA (formerly Computer Associates). We have funded projects to safeguard our utility grid and create cyber security research labs at SBU and New York Institute of Technology. The region is also home to CEWIT (The Center for Wireless and IT) in which several companies in the cyber security field are located. This all positions us well to leverage these assets into a new cyber strategy.

WHAT WE'LL DO

TX Te are supporting a third cyber **VV** lab facility at Hofstra University. The proposed Hofstra Cybersecurity Innovation and Research Center will support research and teaching. This unique joint venture between Hofstra's School of Business and School of Engineering is expected to work cooperatively with Stony Brook and NYIT's existing Cyber labs and has the potential to create a network of Cyber research labs to train students and spin out commercial cyber businesses. Also this year we will support funding for a cyber IT facility at Suffolk County Community College to supply a pool of trained cyber students.

CREATE MORE RENTAL HOUSING IN MULTIFAMILY **DEVELOPMENTS**

A s "America's First Suburb," Long WHAT WE'VE DONE the strength of single-family home developments. Although the Long Island Rail Road added station after station during this period, the region ultimately became dependent on the automobile. These new Long Islanders moved from the "big city" to enclaves where "local control" and "home rule" became a religion, and the First Commandment of Suburbia - the NIMBY battle cry - was "Thou Shalt Not Build High Rise." No wonder change has come slowly. But come it has. While rentals make up about 20 percent of our housing stock, Long Island is seeing a steady rise in multi-family, mixed-use projects. Over the past 12 years, an estimated 13,000 new downtown rental units have been approved with another 10,000 units making their way through the approval and construction pipeline. Specifically, since 2010, Suffolk County has seen 4,363 new apartment units added to the housing stock. Despite all this activity, however, we still have a long way to go to meet the projected demand for tens of thousands of new units.

Ye have invested in parking and W sewers at the Ronkonkoma Hub, a new downtown with mixeduse development. Phase One of the project includes six buildings expected to be completed in second quarter 2020. We invested in infrastructure at the Meadows at Yaphank, another mixed-use development, providing affordable and market rate housing and retail services. Some of the rental homes will benefit researchers at Brookhaven National Laboratory (BNL), as well as faculty of nearby academic institutions. Wyandanch Village, also a large recipient of LIREDC support, has seen a formerly blighted parcel around the area's LIRR station develop into a promising new neighborhood. Two mixed use buildings are complete and fully leased and a third broke ground this year.

WHAT WE'LL DO

X e will continue to support **W** multifamily housing in strategic locations. The LIREDC is supporting two sewer projects to enable the Estella Housing Development, a mixed-use development with affordable housing and commercial space in the Village of Hempstead; and Matinecock Court Housing Development an affordable, LEED Platinum-certified development in the Town of Huntington.



ARGYLE THEATER

Get ready for curtains up at the new Argyle Theatre in downtown Babylon Village.

Originally built in 1922, showing vaudeville and silent films, the newly renovated space has been restored to its original single theatre configuration with an orchestra and balcony. The resulting live theatrical venue is suited for full scale Broadway-caliber productions, all of which are being produced in-house and with professional actors.

The much-anticipated \$3 million project, which supports LIREDC strategies that see the arts as important to developing appealing downtowns, has been brought to life by the father-and-son duo of Mark and Dylan Perlman. Owning and operating The Argyle is a dream come true for the pair, who purchased the space in February of 2017. As Dylan Perlman, a working actor himself, explained, "We want to be a convenient alternative to having to take a train or pay for parking and tolls," as they do when they travel into the city for theater. Added Mark, a longtime public-school psychologist who also runs a private practice in Wantagh: "Whether it's from Village Hall, or the shopkeepers, or their patrons, the reactions we've gotten have been tremendous; it feeds us."

The Argyle will produce live entertainment on a yearround basis and will also feature classes and summer camp programs for those interested in the performing and technical arts, along with Children's and Educational Theatre. Babylon Mayor Ralph Scordino noted, "A performing arts space like this will make the village an even more desirable place to visit and to live. It's going to be a tremendous advantage for our business district to have a cultural arts center here."

Filling a cultural void on Babylon's Main Street, the renovated theatre will become a placemaking destination for its area residents, fellow Long Islanders and out-of-town visitors as well. That's why ESD awarded the Perlman's \$150,000 for construction, and the Babylon Town Industrial Development Agency awarded tax breaks worth nearly \$300,000.

MAKE DOWNTOWN MORE VIBRANT WITH CULTURAL INVESTMENT

WHAT WE'VE DONE

WHAT WE'LL DO

s our live/work/play communities Aemerge, placemaking investments evolve from fundamental infrastructure to recreational, cultural and other amenities that increase foot traffic and create a pulse or "vibe" that keeps people coming back. With funding from Round Seven the YMCA is expected to construct a fitness complex in **Wyandanch**, as part of a continued Opportunity Agenda commitment to Suffolk's poorest community. The center will complement the ongoing Wyandanch Rising development by creating a resource for child care and healthy-living programs, and significantly – provide job opportunities to local residents. The **Argyle Theater** in Babylon Village, funded in Round Six, now offers a taste of Broadway. The 1920s movie house, having undergone an LIREDC-supported renovation, recently opened its doors to enchance a walkable stretch of restaurants and independent shops. Peconic Crossing, funded in Round Five, in downtown Riverhead brings one and twobedroom apartments with preference to artists and Sandy victims. The new complex will offer art gallery space for its residents, facilitating creativity and collaboration.

The LIREDC will continue its support **I** of arts and culture in downtowns this year with three new projects. Gallery North, a not-for-profit gallery in historic Setauket, promotes the finest contemporary regional art and craft. It will expand by building new exhibition space for local artists. Southampton Arts Center will enhance its historic grounds and arboretum with a new stage to expand its outdoor arts programming as part of their long-term project for restoration and expansion of the iconic building and grounds. The East End Children's Museum will build a permanent facility in underserved Riverside to expand the community's access to arts and cultural programming with plans for providing permanent, full-fledged, year-round enrichment for kids.

MAKE DOWNTOWNS MORE ACCESSIBLE WITH MORE PARKING

WHAT WE'VE DONE

successful downtown – one that Aadds valuable new employees and revenues, as well as retains the wealth of aging Baby Boomers seeking to downsize – requires another feature. That's parking. One of the goals of clustering housing near transportation hubs is to get people out of their cars, easing congestion and pollution. But the reality is that most Long Islanders drive cars to shop or get to work. And since a "hot" downtown is going to attract visitors from far and wide, adequate parking is a must. The LIREDC believes that multi-level parking garages are the best solution and we have urged the state to invest in such facilities at the Ronkonkoma Hub, Nassau Hub, Downtown Huntington and other commercial centers in the region.

WHAT WE'LL DO

The LIREDC continues its support I for parking in downtowns this year. The Village of Patchogue will construct a new public parking garage to meet downtown development needs. The structure will also house the Bus Rapid Transit stop connecting Patchogue to Ronkonkoma. Suffolk County Community College, and Stony Brook University. 225 Northport LLC will construct parking infrastructure to support new commercial space in the Village of Northport. It will be located across the street from the village's popular theater and will substantially reduce the overwhelming demand on the municipal parking currently available.



TRADEABLE SECTORS


ince early in its history, through the hey days of its aviation and aerospace "eras," Long Island has been a manufacturing and exporting powerhouse. From timber and fish traded by the first settlers and the potatoes and cauliflower on its 19th and 20th Century farms, to the aircraft that helped win World War II and land the first man on the moon, our region has generated great wealth from selling what we have made to the world. In recent times, tradeable exports have declined as an overall facet of Long Island's economy. But with more than 100,000 jobs on Long Island supported by exporting, the LIREDC has consistently recognized their continued importance.

That's why we have promoted two over-arching Tradeable Sectors/ Global NY strategies as key to a sustainable economic future. One is to reinvigorate our manufacturing sector through transformation from traditional defense and aerospace to advanced technology products, and create skilled, high-value jobs and a network of nimble companies that can develop synergistic partnerships with companies in other regions. The second is to augment the export capacity of Long Island companies and attract foreign direct investment in the region by bringing together experienced exporters, relevant government agencies, and our world-class education and research institutions to identify and pursue potential business opportunities overseas. We believe these strategies will help us remain "open for business" to the world.

ur companies that make products and sell them widely not only provide jobs but bring in dollars from outside the region that grow our economy. And they provide links to new ideas and successful ventures that can translate into business relationships beyond our borders and even the development of new products inspired by them. With a network of support systems that range from state incentives, partnerships with universities, and workforce training, which is growing ever more important for our region, we are able to help manufacturers find success on Long Island.

Employment in tradeable sectors creates opportunities for Long Islanders to begin a new job in an entry-level position and learn important skills to grow with their employer, so they can move into higher-wage positions. While employment in manufacturing has declined in New York, Long Island has seen a less severe drop than the rest of the tri- state area. In fact, we have seen growth in industrial jobs throughout Suffolk County. This shows that the manufacturing sector is still a source for employment in our region.

The region's manufacturing companies need help, however, to keep up with the demands of modernization and other global factors. With support from the LIREDC we are confident that manufacturing on Long Island will continue to be the important source of jobs and economic growth as it has been historically.

"The ongoing controversy over U.S. tariffs on steel and aluminum imports is one of the most significant issues impacting manufacturing today, especially on Long Island. Moreover, the tariffs are widely expected to have negative effects on key parts of the Long Island supply chain. In recent months, Long Island manufacturers have seen an increase in steel and aluminum prices jump 25 - 40% along with longer lead times imposed to bring in the product. East/West is a Ronkonkoma women-owned based aerospace manufacturer of aircraft seats, helicopter seats, oxygen systems and portable floor cranes for use in the military and commercial markets. We are in our 50th year of business and employ 81 people here on Long Island. Our government contracts are firm-fixed-priced contracts, and we cannot pass along higher material costs; therefore, this will impact our overall profitability. Steel and aluminum are vital to our products and industry. and many LI companies have not planned for this increased cost that will have a significant

impact on their business. This impact may also force downsizing or prevent expansion that would have been experienced as the economy began to soar. East/ West is trying to partner with its customers to see if there is any opportunity to work in tandem with the larger customers in their supply chain to assist with more affordable pricing and reduced lead-time for materials."


WHAT WE'VE DONE

t Stony Brook the Manufacturing and **A Technology Research Consortium** is an ESD designated Manufacturing Extension Partnership Center with the goal of "assisting small to medium-sized manufacturing companies develop business growth and increase competitiveness through training, workforce development, and/ or revitalize/renew their product lines all while supporting our region's priority industry cluster-biotechnology." This center has shown results with more than \$1 million committed thus far to support Long Island manufacturers. Yearround events such as cyber-security training, mentorship programs, and funding workshops complement the financial support the MTRC gives new and growing manufacturers. A recent robotics competition for middle and high school students was an important contribution to creating a sustainable pipeline of talent for our tradeable high-tech sectors.

WHAT WE'LL DO

IREDC will support Stony Brook Smart L/Manufacturing Technology Resource **Center** that will create a complementary facility in the NYS Center of Excellence for Wireless and Information Technology (CEWIT), which houses the state funded Manufacturing Extension Partnership (MEP). Stony Brook will purchase new machinery and equipment to be used by local manufacturers. This project will create new opportunities for businesses to both utilize and train employees with digital production equipment that could help enhance their manufacturing operations.

From February 2017 to June 2018 33 companies were accepted into the Excelsior Jobs program. PROMOTE THE FOOD INDUSTRY AS A KEY GROWING CLUSTER IN THE REGION AND PROVIDE THE SUPPORT FOOD MANUFACTURERS NEED TO THRIVE

WHAT WE'VE DONE

X hen we talk about tradeable sectors, we can't forget the growing Long Island food cluster. The Tradeable Sectors/Global NY Work Group added a representative from the Long Island Food **Council** to the work group to better support the needs of the food industry. Through their network of food manufacturers and a new relationship with the Manufacturing Extension Partnership more resources will be made available. We hope to capitalize on this momentum, particularly with the increasing number of ethnic food producers in our region, and continue to help companies like La Flor Spices, a family owned business that was accepted into the Excelsior Jobs Program this year and will be hiring 15 employees, and Manna Fish Farms, which received funding in Rounds Five and Seven for an innovative fish farming facility on the East End. This is where diversity and technology combine to create a burgeoning new sector.

WHAT WE'LL DO

T e are seeing more and more food **V** companies coming forward for assistance to try out new product lines or expand production. The LIREDC understands the importance of providing the access to the capital needed for these companies to make the investments that will help them grow both domestically and internationally. This Round LIREDC supports Wenner Bread which will hire 25 employees and invest in new machinery and equipment so they can expand into European markets. The LIREDC also supports Haskell's Seafood which plans to open a new fish processing facility in East Quogue that will create 6 jobs and pave the way for the production of organic fish based fertilizer to be used on local farms. Nassau Candy is also supported and will invest in new machinery and equipment to grow their candy production facility in Nassau County.

NOW HIRING

Sometimes the best collaborations are the one's you least expect. The Manufacturing Extension Partnership has been working with the Maryhaven Center of Hope to create new workforce opportunities for members of the Long Island community with special needs. By leveraging resources from FuzeHub, the Small Business Development Center at Stony Brook University and a Manufacturing and Technology Resource Consortium grant

(MTRC), the Maryhaven Center for Hope will transition a card making enterprise from a "sheltered workshop" to a "profitable manufacturing business with a transformation plan outline." By launching this new business gainful employment will be provided for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, as they will design and manufacture the cards. "We at MTRC are glad to be able to have the opportunity to work with Maryhaven through

[the New York State Rehabilitation Association] and FuzeHub, (and to) have a hand in the development of their business and assist in their mission," Kao said in a statement.

ASSIST MANUFACTURERS IN FINDING SKILLED EMPLOYEES TO FILL OPEN POSITIONS

ADVANCE REGIONAL TRADE THROUGH EXCHANGES OF INFORMATION, CONTACTS, FOREIGN MARKET EXPERIENCE, AND PARTNERSHIPS AMONG COMPANIES AND TRADE ORGANIZATIONS.

WHAT WE'VE DONE

Tn 2011 the unemployment rate on Long Island was over 7%, now it hovers around - and sometimes below - 4%. One of the region's biggest challenges, as noted throughout this report, is that employers cannot find enough employees with the proper training. We have been addressing this through attraction – creating exciting places for employees to live, work and play (see placemaking section) - and in supporting our educational institutions and other training providers. In Round Six C&H Machining, a small company in Bohemia, used LIREDC funding to purchase new Dimension Imaging Equipment and hire and train new employees to utilize the machinery, expanding its trained workforce and production capacity.

WHAT WE'LL DO

 \neg iven the growing number of companies U that have trouble finding skilled workers, the LIREDC is supporting an investment by the Electrical Training Center to improve the educational experience for the growing number of students interested in HVAC and electrical training. The learned skills will be transferable to a variety of careers and create new opportunities for the workforce as well as for the employers who need trained workers. Also, the Workforce and Education Work Group meets monthly throughout the year and brings together the colleges, the Workforce Investment Boards, and the region's Workforce Development Institute to strategize how to further help companies fill their jobs as well as train their current and prospective employees. Since 2011 many companies have received Departmental of Labor grants to assist in training their workforce.

WHAT WE'VE DONE

T ong Island is recognized internationally, Ldue to its many successful sectors and the sophisticated workforce and institutions that produce its goods and services. Through The STEP and Global NY Fund grants, Long Island companies that are interested in growing their international market share can apply for funding for overseas travel, trade show participation, marketing, and programs sponsored by U.S. Commercial Service. Companies like CVD Equipment, a manufacturer of process equipment solutions, and BOA Handcuffs, a specialized handcuff manufacturer, received funding to travel with ESD and identify new markets. This type of support allows companies to enter into global markets and remain competitive through long term growth.

WHAT WE'LL DO

S ometimes international travel isn't feasible for busy companies, so the ESD Global NY office will be bringing our international representatives to New York. A foreign office tour with representatives from Mexico, Europe, Israel, South Africa, Canada, and China will be happening in October to give businesses the opportunity to learn about grant funding opportunities and what countries may be worthwhile for expansion. This tour presents an exciting opportunity to reach Long Island companies with resources and provide them with access to knowledge that could help them expand.

 Γ facilities for the fishing training in hospitality services, to sewers that protect the environment enable and that preserves open space, we have invested tens of millions of dollars that have benefitted the related realms of tourism and natural assets. We have helped tourism organizations expand their seasons with creative promotions. We have brought innovation not only to our labs but to the land and farmers and fishermen to buy cutting-edge equipment, and for new fish-farming techniques that will add to revenues and preserve native stocks. We have encouraged the wineries that produce vintages from the grapes they grow on land protected in perpetuity. We have promoted "buy local" programs Island for Long produce. We have underwritten the latest technology for the wholesalers who bring these harvests to market. And we have helped expand these markets, including exports. Ours is a true economic ecosystem.

NATURAL ASSETS

PRESERVING PROTECTING & PRODUCING FROM THE LAND & SEA

Our natural abundance was what first attracted settlers to the region, the Dutch and English who wrested control of the forested lands and fish-filled bays from the Native American tribes that lived here for centuries. And just as much as these assets were part of our past, they are very much a part of our future.

With hundreds of miles of coastline, Long Island has a variety of natural assets that not only still attract visitors yearround but support a way-of-life for many of our 3 million residents. A founding pillar in our heritage, these legacy sectors reinforce a sustainable approach to regional economic growth. As a critical focus of the Natural Assets and Tourism Work Group, investment in programs and facilities that protected the environment and encouraged the sustainable growth of agriculture and fishing were seen as strategically vital and resulted in noteable growth in recent years.

IMPLEMENTATION OF NATURAL ASSETS STRATEGIES

IMPROVE SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE ENTERPRISES

WHAT WE'VE DONE

Increasingly, it's about connections and synergies. Long Island's farms, farm stands and vinevards continue to generate tourism dollars and support our local restaurants and service industries while feeding our local community. The Farmers of the Future initiative was created to lend aid to full-time farmers by way of capital investments and consumer promotion to shop local. Initiated in Round Four by the Peconic Land Trust with a LIREDC-supported grant, Farmers of the Future has helped secure future generations of farmers on Long Island by keeping farmland in production, increasing job opportunities in the agricultural sector and allowing farmers to explore innovative technologies. This on-going program was developed collaboratively by the Long Island Farm Bureau, Cornell Cooperative Extension, Farm Credit East, Edible East End, and the Suffolk County Planning **Commission**. To date, 62 applications have been pre-approved by ESD, totaling approximately \$1 million.

WHAT WE'LL DO

The LIREDC will continue to support L our regional farmers this year with the Choose LI – Local & Independent initiative a cooperative effort to raise awareness, advocate and inspire the community to support local and independent businesses by spending 10% of their weekly food allowance on seasonal fresh food goods across Long Island. New Yorkers spend an average of \$176 a week on food, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. Suffolk has 474.311 households. If 10% of Suffolk households committed to spending 10% of their weekly food budget on local produce, that would equate to \$19 million in direct spending, \$33 million in total economic activity and nearly 1,000 new local jobs.

WHAT WE'VE DONE

Long Island's docks, marinas, ports sustainable fresh fish and shellfish, further supporting local restaurants and the service industry and generating significant revenue for our economy. Montauk remains the state's top port and the 63rd largest in the U.S. LIREDC-supported

projects in this sector were designed to boost the region's eco-tourism and utilize innovative technology to keep Long Island on the forefront of the fishing industry. A prime example is Manna Fish Farms, which employs the latest in submersible cage technology to farm finfish, shellfish and microalgae off our coasts. Restoring the region's waterways and bays to their former ecological balance has been an LIREDC priority from the beginning. Past funding for projects like the **Great South** Bay Shellfish restoration has helped create new opportunities for shellfish farming and restore waters that once provided a substantial portion of our region's clams, scallops and oysters.

WHAT WE'LL DO

A quaculture is one of Long Island's key legacy industries, and in Round Eight LIREDC support of the fishing and shellfish industries remains a priority. Projects such as Haskell's Seafood Expansion and Manna Fish Farm's Shinnecock Dock Restoration will create a variety of jobs and expand processing capacity for fishermen. Additionally, the consolidation of East Hampton's shellfish hatcheries will increase efficiency and create new opportunities for shellfish farmers to learn the trade and grow new businesses.

SUPPORT OUR GROWING CRAFT BEVERAGE INDUSTRIES

WHAT WE'VE DONE

With all the walking and bike trails through our greenways and shorelines, there are more and more places to slake a good thirst. Long Island is home to over 30 farm, micro, and restaurant breweries and tasting rooms. In fact, we

are ranked in the top three regions for craft beverage makers in the state. With Governor Cuomo's encouragement, we have supported our brewers, who generate over 320 jobs and nearly \$92 million in economic activity. The East End Tourism Alliance's Craft Beverage Bonanza widened exposure through thematic off-season weekend events that cross-marketed craft beverage and local farming with other important cultural and tourism related assets. And of course there is the wine. With over 50 vineyards, the Long Island Wine Region is recognized as one of the nation's top ten. The LIREDC-supported efforts of the Long Island Wine Council has boosted awareness of our vintners globally.

WHAT WE'LL DO

As we have seen in past rounds, collaboration is a fertilizer that can nurture fruitful projects. The Long Island Wine Council will work with NY Wine Events on a series of educational and promotional activities with a focus on drawing new visitors from locations west of LI Wine Country. By engaging local wine producers and sommeliers and creating bus tours that make travel easy, this LI Wine Council project will help build new economic activity for our local vineyards and create jobs in several sectors.

FARMS OF THE FUTURE AWARDEES

PETER STEIN, PEEKO OYSTER

PEEKO OYSTER

The Ag Capital Grant has been a catalyst for Peeko Oysters. It has greatly accelerated our timeline for scaling our business. Growing oysters at scale requires significant infrastructure and equipment. With the Ag Capital Grant's support in acquiring and implementing the much needed equipment, we are now well on our way to having an efficient and sustainable business.

CHARLES MASSOUD, PAUMANOK VINEYARD

In any business there are desirable projects which do not always have a good financial justification. One such example is solar power. Even though prices of solar technology have come down it will still take many years for such an installation to break even. Yet it is very desirable as it reduces the use of fossil fuel as well as our dependency on the power utility. A grant will usually help improve the financial cost justification making it a more attractive investment. The payback benefits the business for sure

but it is also a gift to the community as the carbon emissions are reduced for everyone.

MARK ZAWESKI, MKZ FARMS

In recent years I have been transitioning to chisel plowing instead of mold board plowing in an effort to break through the plow pan created by years of conventional plowing. By doing this I am seeing better drainage in my fields and also increases in organic matter. Chisel plowing leaves a tremendous amount of residue on the surface and the disc harrow I purchased with my grant,does a great job at incorporating the rye residue into the upper layer of soil versus plowing it down deep.

MATT SCHMITT, SCHMITT FARMS

Receiving this grant has been vital to our growing business. After working for years to increase our output and expand our ability to distribute, we found ourselves at a standstill without the capital to take the next step. Since receiving the grant we have been able to purchase the equipment necessary to facilitate more efficient production and make upgrades to our facility which allow for greater distribution.



TOURISM

he visitor economy continues to be a critically important driver for our region, generating more than \$700 million in state and local tax revenues and supporting more than 78,202 local jobs. The work of this \$5.9 billion industry has a powerful multiplier impact on Long Island's economy, with over 27% above the state's pre-recession nine million visitors flocking here annually for our rich natural assets such as our parks and beaches as well as the many accommodations, restaurants and cultural attractions. Thus, it should be no surprise that 4.0% in 2017. Long Island's tourism industry remains a top priority for the LIREDC as it continues to deliver a significant return on investment and has proven vital to the growth of our region. We are more than a little aware of how much we are competing with other regions, not just in the tri-state area but the world. Travel dollars can go anywhere.

Tourism generated \$8.5 billion in state and local taxes in 2017, saving each NYS household an average of \$1,172 in taxes. Traveler spending on Long Island increased by



EAST END TOURISM



The East End Tourism Alliance used a Round Six REDC Market New York grant to respond to the increasing importance of video for marketing tourism destinations, attractions and activities. Funding was used to produce a series of short films to introduce prospective visitors to each of the East End's Five Towns as well as to the East End as a region. The videos are now available on the eastendgetaway.com website and social channels, as well as on those of each of its partner destination marketing organizations. The footage was also edited for use in 30- and 60-second TV spots, which have been airing since Spring 2018. Local businesses were invited to participate in the project by producing branded "tags" for use in conjunction with the Town/Regional videos on their own social media channels or in TV Spots. The project's primary sponsor, Hampton Jitney, is featured in all productions. Funding was also used to create a library of video images – categorized by landscape scenes, leisure/sports activities, etc. – that can be uploaded by local partners and businesses to promote specific tourism packages. EETA's \$150,000 media campaign to drive traffic to the videos and packages includes TV spots on CBS and digital ads on the most popular social media channels, including TripAdvisor and Facebook. Based on numerous analyses on the impact of video for tourism marketing which show, for example, that 75% of affluent travelers, 72% of business travelers and 45% of leisure travelers book travel after viewing online travel videos, EETA is confident that its project will increase tourism to the East End of Long Island and New York State.

OPPORTUNITY Agenda

rom its very first meeting, the LIREDC recognized that the region's key challenges were its fragmentation and segregation. Council members understood that divisions born of localism, racism, and exclusion were not just the roots of gross injustices – unequal schooling, household incomes, housing choices and job opportunities - but had dampened the economic vitality of the region as well. The resulting barriers prevented investment from flowing where it could be best used, left talent untapped, and hampered entrepreneurship.

The recession was a moment for Long Island. The housing crisis revealed the dangers of cutting off borrowers and communities from mainstream lending. When foreclosures, unemployment and poverty rates rose, the decline was sharpest in majority-Latino and Black communities that had received a heavy influx of subprime lending communities like Wyandanch and Hempstead Village - but the effects eventually radiated into the broader economy. In response, the LIREDC adopted a two-pronged strategy for

addressing economic distress that saw investments in infrastructure as inseparable from investments in individuals.

Thus, when the state mandated that each region select a community to implement an Opportunity Agenda, the LIREDC had already begun focusing its economic firepower on Suffolk County's poorest community, Wyandanch. Beyond its demographic challenges, which included the introduction of thousands of non English speakers into the mainstream of hamlet life, Wyandanch was a strong candidate for Opportunity Agenda designation because the community had been preparing for such an opportunity for nearly a decade. Residents and elected officials, aided by not-for profits, held visionings, crafted a plan for renewal called Wyandanch Rising and prevailed upon local, state and federal representatives to pump millions into sewage and other infrastructure necessary for major redevelopment.

Thus when the time came, and the resources were there, Wyandanch really was ready to rise with recent employment gains exceeding the regional average.

IMPLEMENTATION OF OPPORTUNITY AGENDA STRATEGIES

FOCUS REGIONAL RESOURCES ON A SINGLE DISTRESSED COMMUNITY

WHAT WE'VE DONE

When the governor formally announced the Opportunity Agenda in Round Three, it not only validated the community's preparations and our strategic approach, but provided the resources to focus on a single economically distressed area. The council carefully reviewed indicators such as poverty rates, median household income and public assistance receipts. We also considered where civic capacity and existing investments would enable state funding to have the greatest impact. But Wyandanch, where a private developer already had partnered with county and town governments to undertake the community's revitalization, was the obvious choice.

WHAT WE'LL DO

With tens of millions of dollars invested in Wvandanch construction LIREDC and ESD staff are conscientiously working with the developer to make sure they follow through and meet their benchmarks. The CDC of Long Island and the YMCA have major projects underway that require careful attention to the details of multilateral negotiations and community preference. We are highly optimistic that the projects will be completed and reap the promised benefit in jobs and community services.

EXPAND OPPORTUNITY AGENDA TO OTHER COMMUNITIES

WHAT WE'VE DONE

Te have begun building on the v successes of the Wyandanch **Community Resource Center (WCRC)** model in other communities. The Huntington Community Development **Agency** successfully secured funding for a Community Resource Center in Huntington Station, applying the WCRC model to address similar local labor market challenges. Nassau County has worked with community organizations in Uniondale to renovate a vacant storefront for use as a workforce and training facility. Most recently, the Empire State Poverty Reduction Initiative developed a plan to improve economic opportunity in Hempstead Village. Although funded through a different state source, early discussions about mobile resource centers align closely with the Wyandanch model, and members of LIREDC Work Group worked on the Hempstead report.

WHAT WE'LL DO

While the barriers of segregation and inequality endure, the LIREDC will continue to contribute to a fairer distribution of opportunities by fostering collaborations and connecting critical nodes like resource centers to the broader regional economy. The LIREDC will continue to support projects in underserved communities will the Interfaith Nutrition Network Community Center in the Village of Hempstead.



INVEST IN DEVELOPING HUMAN POTENTIAL

WHAT WE'VE DONE

The human prong of the Opportunity Agenda has taken shape through a series of CFA grants that prioritize investments in the skills of the residents, ensuring that they will be positioned to take advantage of new LIREDCsupported opportunities in Wyandanch and throughout the region. Beyond its new bricks and mortar, the Wyandanch **Community Resource Center** is central to this strategy, providing a range of services to low-income residents, including case management, employment search and resumé assistance, and employment and vocational training. Through its partnerships, WCRC refers clients to job training programs such as United Way, Suffolk County Community College, and St. Joseph's College. There are early signs that these investments are bringing real change within the community. Wyandanch Rising has brought about a striking visual transformation to the area north of the station, and according to ZIP Code Business Patterns, local employment rose 14% between 2011 and 2016 (compared to roughly 8% island-wide).

WHAT WE'LL DO

IREDC will continue to leverage Lits commitment to developing human capital by supporting additional workforce training programs with a special focus on the unemployed, veterans and minorities. Key among them is the Wyandanch Community Resource Center. The Town of Babylon will invest \$612,150 to acquire new equipment to support the newly constructed Wyandanch Resource Center which provides vital workforce development programs and social services to resident of all ages. Additionally, a prestigious regional science center will be locating a STEM education center in Wvandanch and other underserved communities. And the Sunrise Day Camps, which specializes in children with cancer. is creating a heart-warming and educationally-effective, STEAM-focused program in Wyandanch.

UNITED WAY OF LONG ISLAND

For 10 weeks in the spring, United Way of Long Island held a green construction course funded by the New York State Department of Labor for 25 students to learn the foundation of efficient building. One of those students, Eddie, wrote UWLI a letter that appeared in the agency's blog.

"I was in a point in my life where... I felt like I needed to work on me, be more self-empowered and figure out what I really wanted to do. While being unemployed, things started to get rough... low funds, doing job applications not getting any calls back. Then I had suffered an injury which gave me a lack of confidence...

"I would frequently visit the Department of Labor office to look for job postings or any school programs coming up. The DOL class stood out to me, I felt like I could learn... the basics on many different topics, which would help me find a direction.

"Later, I was told the class was full, but I couldn't accept that. I went down to the United Way office, I insisted I wanted to be a part of the class... Rick the program director was able to find a way to get me in. That made my day.

"By the second week I was highly fascinated, we were learning something serious so I [had to] do well if I wanted to excel. The class [also] introduced me to volunteer opportunities which I always wanted to [do]. Close to the end of class we all took our BPI certification test, I was able to obtain the highest score in the class!! I felt like I accomplished something major.

"After class, I fixed my resume and went on interviews. I filled out applications. I got calls back from engineering jobs, based on what I had learned from class. I never thought something like that would happen, it changed my mindset completely. Less then a week after graduation, I was able to secure a job I would've never thought I'd get so quickly. The course built up my confidence, feeling like I could go for positions I didn't think I was qualified for but got calls for interviews."



Map of Round 8 Proposed Priority and Regionally Significant Projects



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ENGAGEMENT AND SUPPORT OF THE PUBLIC AND LOCAL OFFICIALS

Since 2011 the Long Island Regional Economic Development Council has encouraged the engagement of members of the general public and local governments in the regional council process. Over the past eight years we have expanded our public outreach efforts from simple public information sessions, to use of all social media platforms and informational open houses. Similar to years past we held two CFA workshops and four CFA Open House/ Information Sessions. These events afforded us outreach to over 150 members of academia, private business, municipalities and the public to discuss their projects and receive valuable feedback from NYS Agency representatives.

To further increase our public engagement in 2018 Empire State Development worked in collaboration with our local elected officials to coordinate nine CFA Town Hall meetings to reach interested applicants and the general public. Each Town Hall consisted of a concise general overview of the CFA process, and personalized one on one conversations with attendees regarding available resources and general guidance for their potential projects. These Town Halls were a huge success with over 230 individuals representing private businesses, municipalities and members of the general public that would not have otherwise been engaged.

V. DOWNTOWN REVITALIZATION INITIATIVE

Just as a state economic development official once said that the LIREDC had a downtown revitalization initiative before there was *the* Downtown Revitalization Initiative, Central Islip was a Transit-Oriented Development center before there was Transit-Oriented Development. Way before.

As in 1842!

That's when the Long Island Rail Road arrived in L the unheralded farm and forestry community that would come to be called Central Islip. Soon after, the stopping place known as Suffolk County Station became a hub surrounded by housing and commerce. A half century later, the community became home to one of the world's largest psychiatric hospital, one of the models for the disturbing movie, "The Snake Pit." But the 10,000 patients provided a lot of jobs, and some of their families moved to be nearby. The hospital closed in the mid-90s, and while the community benefitted from serious public investment - to create two college campuses, a minor league ballpark, federal and state courthouses, a hotel, shopping center and several housing developments - the area around the train station continued to decline. Now, it's time for history to repeat itself: The Carleton Avenue corridor by the Central Islip LIRR station is once again poised to rise as the state's DRI choice for 2018. The \$10 million award was announced this summer in an uplifting ceremony, led by Governor Andrew Cuomo and state and local lawmakers.

A bout 80 percent of Cl's population of 34,000 is Black and Latino, one of the highest minority concentrations of any community on Long Island. More than half the residents are Spanish speakers. Although there is much commerce within Cl's boundaries, the poverty rate is well above average. But so is it's potential. As an unincorporated hamlet, it's nearest level of government is Islip Township, whose leadership –notably Town Supervisor Angie Carpenter – demonstrated its commitment to the community's renewal with a strong, locally-driven proposal in a very competitive DRI selection process. Unfortunately, the corridor currently has many vacant, blighted, underutilized properties, poor lighting and sidewalks which gives the impression of an unsafe place to be.

 $B^{\rm ut}$ if the enthusiasm in Westbury and Hicksville is any indication - they were our first two DRI recipients - the \$10 million grant and the collaborative planning effort should boost morale by uniting the people of CI and bringing a mix of attractive housing, restaurants, shops and cultural attractions. And not only are local residents and their leaders supportive, but Cl's recent designation as a federal Opportunity Zone, and the tax breaks that come with it, positions the community to become a magnet for private investment.

Central Islip is a prime example of the sort of community that LIREDC strategies were crafted to help. It could easily have been one of our Opportunity Agenda neighborhoods and was on our radar screen for future inclusion. That's why we are thrilled that its revival was jumpstarted with a DRI grant and all the activity that comes with it.

The end goal is to revitalize the 2/3rd mile commercial corridor into a vibrant, walkable community that will appeal to residents, students of the nearby colleges, the employees of the adjacent courthouses and industrial park, and the visitors to the Ducks minor league baseball stadium. Several vacant parcels near the station are especially conducive to Smart Growth mixed-use development. Not unlike 176 years ago when the LIRR first came to town.

POTENTIAL PROJECTS:

- 1. A mixed-use Transit Oriented Development on vacant land at the former train station on Carleton Avenue.
- 2. A land use study to guide specific zoning changes
- Infrastructure projects such as sidewalks, parking lots (including adding railroad parking), sewers, "complete streets" safety features, façade improvements and a round-about.
- 4. Removal and redevelopment of blighted properties, including the former firehouse
